

## Congressman Smith To Address Dairymen

Brentsville District Community Association Meeting at Nokesville, Tuesday, July 7 at 8:00 P. M.

A very interesting program has been arranged by the Agricultural Committee of the Brentsville District Community Association for the July meeting to be held at the district high school on Tuesday evening, July 7, at 8 o'clock. Congressman Howard T. Smith and John McGill, Jr., Manager of the Maryland and Virginia Milk Producers Association, have been invited and will speak on subjects of vital interest to everyone in Brentsville District and Prince William County. All milk producers of the county are urged to be present to hear Mr. McGill discuss the present milk marketing situation.

In addition to this part of the program, the committee will arrange for interesting entertainment numbers, both dialogue and instrumental.

### HEALTH COURSE AT CHARLOTTESVILLE

The State Health Department will conduct the seventh Institute for Doctors Helpers in the Medical Building at the University of Virginia, July 27-31, inclusive.

The purpose of the course is to interest women in simple nursing care which will qualify them to care for the sick in their own homes, or act as helpers to physicians when trained nurses are neither available nor absolutely necessary. Each day's session will consist of five hours divided into three periods.

Lectures will be given by physicians of the University Hospital and members of the State Health Department on Maternity Care, Personal Hygiene and Community Health. There will be no charge for the course.

### DAIRY 4-H CLUB MEMBERS TO VISIT BELTSVILLE EXPERIMENTAL STATION AND CHESTNUT FARMS DAIRY.

The 4-H dairy club members of the county will visit the plant of the Chestnut Farms Dairy on the morning of Wednesday, July 15. The object of the visit is to give the boys opportunity for gaining a better understanding of the various steps through which milk and its products pass on the way from the farm to the consumer. They will see the milk received and observe the different operations and the effects as it passes through the plant.

The boys will be required to take notes of their observations and submit a story of the trip in the state contest. A trip to the National Dairy Show in October, including all expenses, will be given by the Club Department to the club member in Virginia writing the best story of his or her trip to a dairy plant.

The group will be the guests of Chestnut Farms at a luncheon and go on to the Beltsville Experimental Station in the afternoon. The dairy work being done in Beltsville will be explained by Thomas W. Moseley, Director in Charge, and his assistants.

### DAIRY CLUB MEMBERS JUDGED GUERNSEYS AT WILLIAM ROWLANDS, WARRENTON, WEDNESDAY.

A group of Prince William dairy club members met at the farm of William Rowland, Warrenton, to make a study of the herd and dairy and for judging practice. Mr. Rowland's herd made an average of 494.39 pounds of butterfat per cow in the Fauquier Dairy Herd Improvement Association for the year ending June 30, 1930. This record topped the 171 herds in the 1930 Dairy Herd Honor Roll for Virginia.

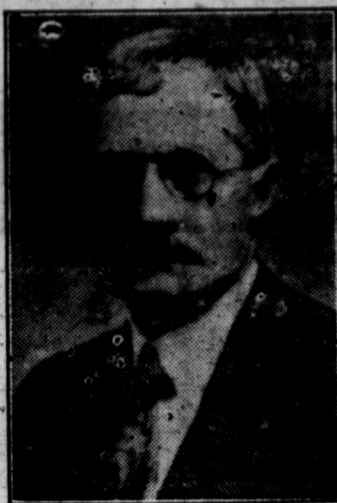
Both the bride and groom are well known in Prince William and many friends wish the young couple a long happy and prosperous life.

### Action of Committee Illegal

At a meeting of the Democratic Committee of the Eighth Congressional District in Alexandria on Saturday, the recent action of the Stafford Democratic Committee calling off the Primary Election was declared illegal, null and void, and the primary ordered held as originally provided for. Attorney General John R. Saunders has also ruled that the Stafford Committee had no legal right to rescind the primary election.

### Eighth District Committee Overrules County Committee

An appeal was taken from the decision of the local committee to the district committee by Dan M. Chichester, member of the House of Delegates from Stafford and Prince William, who is a candidate for Treasurer of Stafford County, G. K. Massie, Jr., candidate for Supervisor for Aquia District, and Clinton T. Heflin, candidate for Supervisor for Rock Hill District. C. O'Connor Goolrick, of Fredericksburg, represented the Stafford Committee and Albert Bryan, of Alexandria, represented Chichester, Massie and Heflin. After lengthy argument and the presentation of much evidence on both sides, the Eighth District Committee overruled the action of the Stafford Committee on the ground that it was contrary to law and against the interest of the Democratic Party.

Early in the year W. D. Reamy, eighty-year-old Treasurer of Stafford, who has held the office for the past 24 years, announced that he would not offer again for re-election. Dan M. Chichester and N. N. Berry immediately announced their candidacies for the Democratic nomination for the office. The Republican Party nominated H. W. Simpson as its candidate for Treasurer.

### Berry Orders Primary.

The Stafford County Democratic Committee, apparently controlled by the faction that is trying to defeat Chichester, met in February and ordered the primary method of selecting the party nominees and fixed August 4 as the date for the primary election. N. N. Berry, who was then chairman of the committee, presided over the meeting. Numerous candidates paid the fees required of them by the committee, filed their petitions and entered the primary in good faith.

### Calls Off Primary.

On June 13, a week after the time limit had expired, the committee was assembled and by a vote of 6 to 5 called off the primary, and threw all Democratic candidates into the November election.

### Chichester Appeals

Chichester, Massie and Heflin in an effort to make their opposition live up to their agreement and nominate candidates in the primary, appealed to the Eighth District Committee, and the action of the county committee was overruled as being illegal and the primary was ordered to be held.

### Berry May Withdraw.

It is widely rumored in Stafford that rather than run the risk of being defeated by Chichester in the primary, Berry will withdraw and run as an independent in the November election. It is also believed that W. F. Powers and W. A. Franklin, who are opposing Massie and Heflin respectively, may also withdraw.

### Would Be Duty of Committee to Declare Chichester Nominee.

Should Berry, Powers and Franklin withdraw, Chichester, Massie and Heflin will be left in the primary without opposition and under the law it will become the duty of the Stafford Committee to declare them the Democratic nominees.

### Politics in Muddle

Politics in Stafford are in a complete muddle and many voters are blaming the politicians who attempt to dominate the county committee for the condition they have brought about by their policy of rule or ruin. Some are indignant at their alleged unjust and high handed efforts to eliminate the primary. It is understood that the County Democratic Committee will appeal from the action of the District Committee in forcing them to hold the primary.

### May Affect Legislative Contest.

It has been pointed out that should Berry, Powers and Franklin withdraw and bolt the Democratic party, there will be no contests in the primary for party nominations for county offices, and therefore probably only a small vote will be polled in Stafford. The effects on the legislative vote are, therefore, in the balance, and the next few weeks should prove quite interesting.

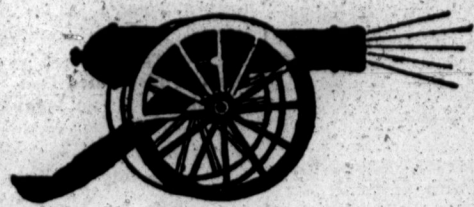

## THE DAIRY FESTIVAL

Next Wednesday afternoon will mark something of a turning point in the movement which is under way to promote a Dairy Festival in Piedmont, Va.

The dairy industry is in a crucial stage and promotion work is much needed.

The JOURNAL trusts that everyone who can will make it a point to attend this meeting which is open to all Piedmont Counties of northern Virginia.

## THE FOURTH OF JULY

We are celebrating the hundred and fifty-seventh anniversary of the signing of our national Declaration of Independence.

The day is one on which we should take stock of our national status to see whether we are moving steadily forward to a finer idealism and greater efficiency in government, or whether we may be drifting into a status not in harmony with the dreams of the patriotic and astute founders of this Republic.

We have made some remarkable departures from the original conception of our forefathers. A majority section of the country repudiated the solemn obligations which bound the states into a national identity. The Constitution, now regarded as sacredly binding to all parties concerned, was disregarded by the North, plunging the nation into a bloody conflict. The South fought to vindicate the sacred bond of the contract known as our Constitution, and her viewpoint has been vindicated throughout the world.

The nation again departs from the sound advice of Washington when it became permanently enmeshed in European affairs. We have also departed from the original plan in the manner of electing our Chief Executive. The old Electoral College has become a mere formality and the people of both major political parties have to elect the candidate selected by party organizations in convention.

We have further modified our governmental plan in giving to the federal government local police powers. The conception that our forefathers would have had of the way to handle national prohibition would have been to delegate enforcement to the States, leaving the central government to handle interstate traffic and smuggling.

These are all vital modifications in original conceptions. Time will reveal the wisdom of these changed viewpoints. In the meantime all patriotic citizens appreciate the marvelous advantages and opportunities we enjoy in these United States and we celebrate the "Fourth" in a true spirit of patriotism and optimism for the future.

## TIME TO BEGIN SPENDING

This is the time to begin putting money back into circulation. There is more money in bank, subject to the checks of individuals, than any previous time in our national history.

It is lying there because its owners have been waiting for the business situation to "touch bottom."

All the indications now are that it has touched bottom and has begun to rise. At the moment, retail prices of every sort of commodity are lower than they have been since days before the war. A dollar will buy as much of almost everything today as a dollar and a half would buy two years ago. The

reduction in the price of raw materials is now being fully reflected in the price of manufactured goods to the consumer.

There may never be another opportunity, in the life time of us, to make a dollar go as far as it will go today. We would never advise anybody to go contrary to Benjamin Franklin's wise counsel, when he said: "Never buy anything you don't want merely because it is cheap." But we know that thousands of people in this community and vicinity have been putting off buying things which they really want, believing that they would be lower.

We feel justified in saying to those people that the time has come for them to buy. Business in general is beginning to pick up rapidly. We can't tell how far up it is going, and probably we shall not have another such "boom" as we had three and four years ago. But with business picking up even everybody, money for wages and materials getting back into circulation, the number of buyers will increase and the law of supply and demand will attend to sending retail prices upward again.

If ever the advice to "buy now" was good, it is today.

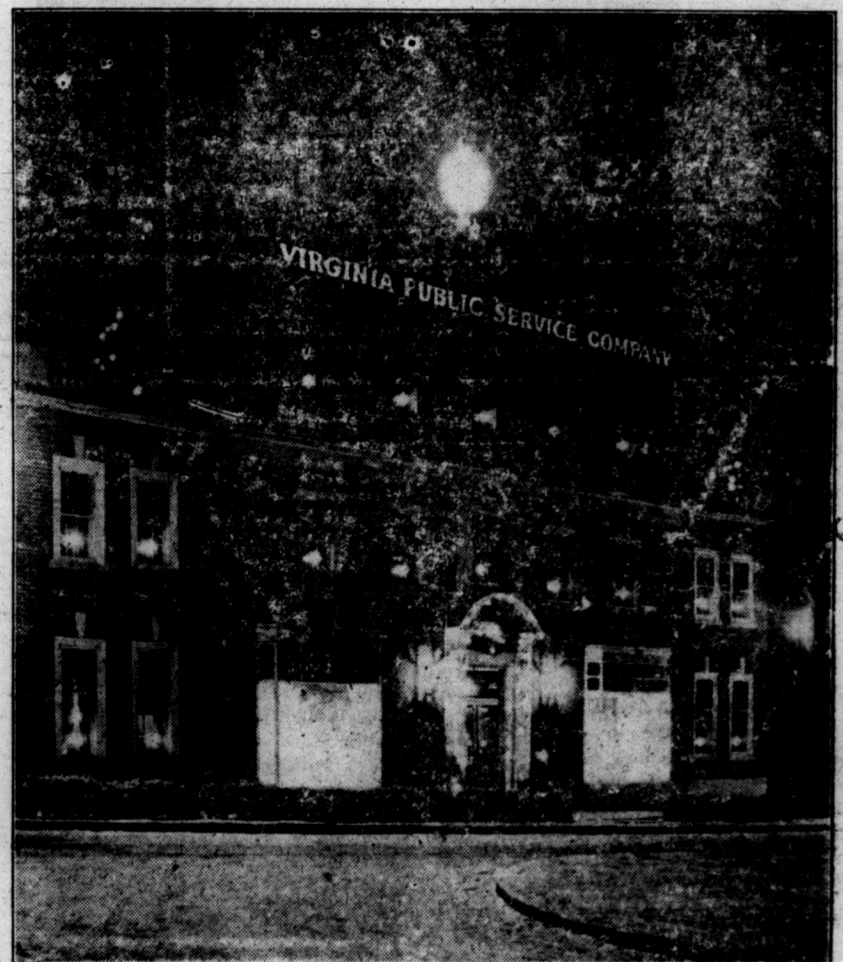
