## GRAY VETERANS PRESENT FEALTY PLEDGE TO F. D.

### Resolution, First of Kind, Pleases President Greatly.

The first formal pledge of fealty ever made to a President of the United States by Confederate soldiers was given to President Roosevelt Tuesday by Adjutant-General Harry Rene Lee of the United Confederate Veterans and General Rice A. Pierce, commander of the Tennessee Division, U. C. V.

General Lee, 88, and General Pierce, 87, were presented to the President by Senator Bachman (D., Tenn.). A copy of the resolution adopted by Confederate veterans at a meeting in Atlanta last September and pledging their allegiance, was given to Mr. Roosevelt by General Lee.

"I certainly appreciate this," the President said. "I'm going to put it in my own room. I hope to see you frequently again, and the next time I review a parade, I hope that you both can be with me in the reviewing stand."

The veterans were accompanied by Representatives Cooper, McKeon and Byrns, Democrats of Tennessee, and by Cecil Sims, Nashville, Tenn., attorney. General Pierce was a member of Congress several years ago.

## EXPLAINS FUND APPROPRIATIONS

### Town Manager Addresses Kiwanis.

Bish Gibson as chairman for entertainment at the Kiwanis last Friday fell back on local talent and called on Town Manager Cocke to explain some of the workings of the new public funds.

Mr. Cocke rose to the occasion and explained the methods of the public works funds as distinguished from the civil works administration.

Referring to local matters, he showed the appropriations which had been given Manassas and the county in the next few weeks amounting to \$7,000. He stated in detail what work would be done here.

The club is recognizing the approach of Christmas and is devoting more time to carols.

### TO TEACH EVENING CLASSES

Superintendent R. C. Haydon has received information that at his recommendation Mr. Frank G. Sigman has been appointed under the Federal Emergency Relief program to be in charge of adult education in Manassas and vicinity. This will give an opportunity to those not now in school who have done either elementary school work, high school work, or even some college work, to advance their education. Plans are under consideration to do the most good to the greatest number and yet the number to be helped must be limited.

Those who are interested may meet Mr. Sigman at his home, 334 N. Main St., Manassas, after Monday from 7 to 9 p.m. The actual work will begin after New Year's Day. Already a few have indicated their interest in the plan.

### MR. MOORE APPOINTED

Mr. W. S. Moore has been appointed under the Emergency Relief in Education to conduct a class for persons male or female who are above sixteen years of age and who wish to learn to read, write, do simple arithmetic, and learn the rudiments of an elementary education. Persons interested are requested to make application at the office of the Superintendent of Schools at the court house. If there are more than Mr. Moore can handle, an additional teacher will probably be provided.

This is a real opportunity for those persons who have been deprived of these advantages and it is hoped that quite a number will take advantage of it.

### MATTER OF MOMENT

Tomorrow morning Judge Browning, of Culpeper, will decide a question which has been in the circuit court for several weeks.

The last session of the legislature authorized town councils to issue bonds without popular vote to aid in the present emergency situation, this has been conceived as permission to issue bonds for the town light plant of Culpeper.

The legality of the act has been attacked by joint action of the Virginia Public Service Company and certain citizens within the town.

The main arguments for the complainants have been presented by Burnett Miller, of Culpeper, while John S. Barbour, of Fairfax, has defended the act.

**SERMONETTE**

Matthew 1:21: "And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JESUS; for he shall save his people from their sins."

The Old Testament gives many titles of the Messiah but not his proper name. As prophecy is about to be fulfilled, God reveals His name and office to Joseph. "Jesus" was the personal name given to our Lord. The Jews laid great stress upon the significance of names. Jesus is the Greek equivalent of the Hebrew Joshua which means SAVIOUR. Christ is His official name, and means ANOINTED, the same as the Hebrew Messiah. What a name! Jesus, Christ! Saviour Messiah! Name above every name.

We have here also set forth the mission of the Messiah. "He shall save his people from their sins." The world long awaited a saviour. Everywhere there was the sense of sin, wrong, guilt and offended deity. The world in its helplessness was blindly groping for peace and a redeemer. There was no salvation to be found in Baal, Ashtoreth, Dagon, Chemosh or Molech; nor were the gods of Greece and Rome living powers in men's souls. The times were ripe; God gave Himself in Christ Jesus. The promise to Abraham is to be fulfilled—"in thy seed shall the nations of the earth be blessed."

The babe of Bethlehem's manger is the Saviour of the world. That night an angel announced to the shepherds "Good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born . . . a Saviour which is Christ the Lord."

When Jesus rode thro' the streets of Jerusalem the multitudes acclaimed "Hosanna to the Son of David." "Hosanna" is the Hebrew for "Save now." And so down the ages comes the Christmas message in joyous peaces "The Saviour is born."

"He shall save His people from their sins," the promise was not to deliver from their enemies. Jesus would have been received a hero had he delivered them from the hated Roman yoke, but no, He refused to head an army against Rome; nor was the promise to save them diseases. The land was filled with sick, crippled, lepers, etc., and "Jesus lovingly healed them of their diseases but this was incidental. He was physician to the soul rather than to the body; nor was it to save them from their troubles. They had sorrows aplenty and Christ invited to come to Him "all ye that labour and are heavy laden" but His chief work was to deliver from the bondage of sin.

We must ever connect the birth of Christ with the cross of Christ, for it was on the cross that atonement was made for the sin of the world. "The blood of Jesus Christ, his Son, cleanse us from all sin." THERE WAS NO OTHER WAY BUT THE CROSS, so Christ in Gethsemane prayed "If this cup may not pass away from me except I drink it, thy will be done."

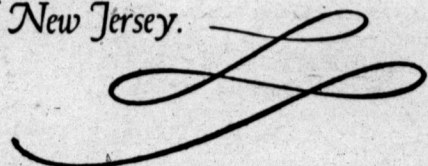
On the cross "His own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live into righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed."

To Report Kidnaping Call National 7117

Justice Department At Washington Has Special Telephone For Such Cases

In an effort to curb kidnaping, the Department of Justice at Washington, D. C., has had installed a special telephone—National 7117, to which calls from any point in the United States may be made in the interest of apprehending the criminals at the earliest possible moment.

Assistant to the Attorney General, William Stanley in a broadcast made over the network of the National Broadcasting Company recently said: "Please telephone the division headquarters at Washington. It is not closed at any time during the twenty-

four hours of the day. The telephone number is easy to remember. We wish everyone to know and use this number, when necessary. It is Washington, D. C., National 7117."

Mr. Stanley urged that no public statement about a kidnaping be made until the proper time and that contact be made immediately with one of the agencies of the division of investigation so that an agent might give the calling party assistance and advice. Any judge, prosecuting attorney, sheriff, chief of police or court official, he said, should be able to advise where the nearest field office of the division of investigation is located. Where difficulty is experienced in locating such an office, citizens are directed to telephone the division headquarters at Washington.

AMPLIFYING THE VOICE

Amplifying the human voice by the Bell public address system is an accomplishment well known to people of almost every land.

The amplification of watch sounds, which, also, is a development of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, is arousing considerable interest. A few months ago announcement was made by the telephone laboratories of an electrical watch timer. With this recent development is now possible to facilitate the repair of watches by amplifying the sounds.

The amplified sound of a watch is radiated from the case. Its vibrations, according to A. F. Bennett, transmission engineer of the telephone laboratories, if suitably amplified, will be a good measure of the sound emitted by the watch. Use of the amplification equipment is described by Mr. Bennett in a novel and interesting manner in the Bell Laboratories Record.

The metal case of the watch, he says, is made to act as one plate of an electric condenser, and is separated by a very thin sheet of paper from the other plate or electrode which is of about the same size. The plates are charged by a battery connected across them through a high resistance. The stationary electrode is connected to the grid of a vacuum tube amplifier. Thus, the minute movements of the watch case cause corresponding variations in the capacitance of the condenser formed by the watch and electrode. The resulting fluctuations in potential are amplified by an amplifier of high gain and reproduced in a receiver. By means of this apparatus sounds inaudible to the unaided ear may be raised to almost any desired intensity.

A unit of this equipment has been produced by the laboratories for use by Tiffany and Company in the repair of fine watches. The watch is held in place directly over the small electrode by a spring member terminating in a rubber cup. The electrode is a small nickel-silver disc embedded in a circular plate of special insulating material. The first stage vacuum tube is located directly beneath the electrode in order to reduce the stray capacitance, and hence the extraneous noise, to a minimum.

A watch may operate perfectly when held at a certain angle, but because of a defect in some member or misalignment of some bearing, the movement of the mechanism may be seriously restricted in other positions. All this is evidenced by changes in the sound when the position of the watch is shifted. Accordingly, the table on which the watch is held is arranged to be rotated to any angle and locked.

By the use of a master watch and the amplifying equipment, it is possible to reduce greatly the time needed for regulating a watch. The master watch is placed on a duplicate amplifying equipment, which is connected in circuit so that both the master and the watch under adjustment may be heard simultaneously. Volume controls are provided so that the sounds may be made of approximately equal loudness. Very slight differences in the speed of the two watches may then be detected. Hence, the speed of the watch may be quickly checked against that of the master. In this way much time may be saved in the adjustment of the watch, particularly in timing it in various positions.

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**Pea Roast and Cutlets**

SOUNDS peculiar, doesn't it, to write about a pea roast and pea cutlets, just as if peas could be cut up like a meat animal. You'll find that the recipes we mean are not peculiar, but peculiarly good, though we'll have to admit that the first one is just a trifle nutty. It is

**Pea and Walnut Roast:** Mix lightly together one and one-half cups pea pulp, one cup soft bread crumbs, one-half cup chopped walnuts, one-fourth cup butter, two-thirds cup canned tomato soup, one beaten egg, salt, pepper and onion juice. Put into a buttered baking dish or loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, for from thirty to forty-five minutes, or until set and brown. Serve with hot canned tomato soup, undiluted. This serves eight.

**These Cutlets Are Cuts**

**Tomato and Pea Cutlets:** Combine one cup drained canned peas, one-half cup very thick white sauce and two slightly-beaten egg yolks. Drop by spoonfuls into hot buttered skillet and fry brown, turning over once. Dip eight slices ripe tomato in flour, and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Sauté in the fat in which the cutlets cooked. Serve a roast on each slice of tomato. This recipe serves eight.
