Members will pay for this function, and no money will be taken from the treasury.

After the discussion of new business, the meeting was turned over to the Chairman of the Program Committee, Miss Harriet Bozarth, who had kindly consented to come and talk to the club on music. Miss Bozarth told in a very charming manner, the story of the opera Aida, and played a selection from the opera. She then told briefly of Faust, and of Xerxes, and played the Soldier's Chorus, and Largo. Miss Bozarth is a very accomplished musician, and plays the piano very beautifully. The Club was indeed happy to have her with them, and was indeed grateful for her lovely program.




