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RED CROSS IS CLOSING DRIVE

Rev. DeChant Receives Encouraging Reports for Many Communities.

With the coming of Thanksgiving the annual Red Cross Roll Call drive draws to a close. While a few scattered memberships are secured throughout the year, the main drive all over the country is held in November.

The Roll Call chairman, Rev. John M. DeChant, in commenting on results thus far, stated that an encouraging feature of the local drive is the marked increase of five dollar memberships, over twenty having been obtained. Only two or three reports have come in from workers in the county and these show over fifty memberships. About sixty Manassas memberships have been reported to the chairman, with many workers still to be heard from. Fuller reports will come in after Thanksgiving and will be announced in the Journal next week.

Local residents are more or less familiar with public health activities that are carried on by Miss Neel, the county nurse. The American Red Cross, in reporting its accomplishments for the year, states that public health nurses made over 1,200,000 home visits to the sick. The new government colony in Majanaska, Alaska, the islands off the coast of Maine and the Philippine Islands are only the outposts of this nation-wide service. Eight hundred nurses are on regular duty, and the Red Cross has enrolled over 50,000 nurses who stand as a reserve for use in any great emergency.

Long before the appointed hour every seat in the church had been taken and crowds lined the walls and crowded the entrance.

Mrs. A. S. Gibson presided at the organ and rendered very softly appropriate selections as the ushers escorted the guests to their seats. Mr. Charles Armistead Sinclair, jr., sang with much expression "O Perfect Love." A lull in the music and then the beautiful strains of Mendelssohn's Wedding March announced the arrival of the bride who, on her father's arm, followed the bridal party to the altar where they were met by Mr. Ratcliffe and his best man.

"CONSERVATION OF VIRGINIA'S RESOURCES"

Address of Wilbur C. Hall, Chairman of the Virginia State Commission on Conservation and Development before the State Teachers College, at Harrisonburg, Va., November 13, 1935, at 11:00 o'clock A. M.

(Continued from last week)

The modern conservation movement was initiated and accelerated by the rapid destruction of our fine forests. As a result of memorials presented by the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a forestry bureau was established in the United States Department of Agriculture. The first national forest reserve was created in 1891. Geological studies of the arid Southwest led to the establishment of an irrigation division of the United States Geological Survey. In 1907 President Roosevelt appointed the Inland Waterways Commission. The first report of this commission emphasized the interlocking character of the problems of natural resources and their conservation. There followed, in May, 1908, the memorable White House Conference devoted to an intelligent and thorough consideration of the conservation of the natural resources of the nation. The personnel of the Conference was indeed noteworthy, including the President, Vice-President, the Cabinet, the Supreme Court, the Congress, governors of 34 states, and representatives of 68 national societies, as well as many others. Minerals, soils, forests, and waters were discussed and startling facts were announced. The governors drew a strong series of resolutions "pointing out the extravagance and waste of the past, and making it clear that upon the conservation of our natural resources depends the foundations of our prosperity."

Not long after the Conference, the President appointed the National Conservation Commission. Four sections were assigned to the study of minerals, waters, forests, and soils. The report of the Commission, its technical experts, and the secretaries of the sections was transmitted in 1909 to the President and later published in three volumes. (1)

It has been said that "these volumes gave the first available inventory of the natural resources of the nation." The inventory was a marked advance over guesses about the natural wealth of the nation. Many things happened in subsequent years. One of the most important is that many millions of acres of land have been set aside as parks, forests, and other reservations for the use of all citizens in this and future generations. Other millions of acres have been withdrawn from uncontrolled private exploitation of inherited stores of mineral wealth.

The publication in 1910 of a textbook on the "Conservation of Natural Resources in the United States," by President Van Hise of the University of Wisconsin, did much to focus attention on the growing importance of the problems of conservation. This book appeared in a new edition (2) by several authors in 1930 and is useful both to teachers and the general public. All in all many strides forward have been made during the 20th century in attempts at the wise conservation and development of our resources. But plenty of real work remains to be done. Much of it must be educational, for the problem is one that concerns future generations. Outside of forests and wild life, when most of the inherited resources are used, there is little possibility of renewing the supply—the mills of the gods grind too slowly. Depleted mineral deposits and lowered water levels can not be restored. Each of us has a selfish interest in the conservation of natural resources irrespective of our great moral obligation to our children's children. There is, perhaps, no other single problem of such fundamental importance to the future welfare of our citizens.

REPUBLICAN CLUB IS ORGANIZED

Young Republicans Perfect Working Set-up at Culpeper.

The Young Republicans of the 8th Congressional District met at Culpeper on Saturday afternoon and evening at a special convention called by W. E. Trusler, chairman of the 8th Congressional Republican Committee, for the purpose of organizing an official setup. Mr. Trusler presided at the opening of the meeting and the following officers were elected: Chairman, John Locke Greene, Clarendon; first vice-chairman, Miss Janet Trusler, Manassas; second vice-chairman, George R. Hon. William Mosely Brown, former Republican candidate for Governor of Virginia, made an address in which he introduced a snappy slogan by stating that "Ordeal" be substituted for "New Deal." He predicted that if reelected the President will become a socialist during a second term.

Speaking as a substitute for Governor Nice, of Maryland, Hon. Philip P. Campbell, former Kansas Congressman, said that the question had become one of whether we should Americanize or Russianize America.

The meeting, which was attended by hundreds of interested citizens, adjourned for a banquet and later a beautiful ball at the Pot and Kettle Club on the Orange road. Such a meeting was healthy in its aspect and tended to consolidate Republican youth of the 8th district in its activities.

Present from Manassas besides Mr. Trusler and Miss Trusler was Col. R. A. Hutchison who made an extemporaneous address at the request of the chairman.

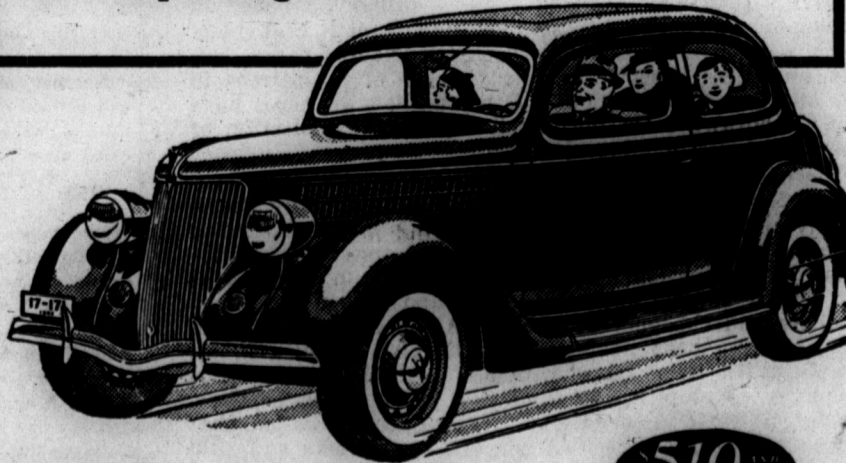

THE VOLUNTEER FIREMEN
A Town's Best Friends

Early Sunday morning (Nov. 17), all Manassas heard the siren ring out the signal that told of a fire in its midst. Rain was pelting down. It had been falling for days, and the atmosphere was bleak; raw enough to make any one welcome the warmth and the comforts of a home.

But that siren told of danger at hand; of a fire that might spread destruction to the town. It was the "call to arms" to the volunteer firemen of Manassas and promptly they responded only to find that they must fight heroically to save a burning church and to curb the flames that threatened to spread over nearby buildings, and even to the lumberyard opposite.

It was a moment when valiant minds, brave hearts and willing hands were required and the men of Manassas arose to the needs of the ordeal. They worked to save a church from destruction. Finding efforts to that end might prove futile, they labored to prevent the flames from enveloping nearby homes and neighboring buildings and, for this object, they called for help from other towns.

The volunteer fire departments of Warrenton, Herndon, Fairfax and Falls Church responded. They were on the scene in an incredibly short time; having made perilous trips over wet roads, and the fire was soon under control.

And once again Manassas has cause to be grateful to the men of its Volunteer Fire Department whose heroic efforts rebound to their credit and to the safety of the town. Nor can too much be said in praise of the volunteer firemen from neighboring towns because of their prompt response to the call for help, and for the efficient services they rendered.

Two New Points

—now play a part in banking policy.

Without going into the technicalities, we might say that they create facilities which give the banks more "elbow room" in respect to utilizing their resources in granting sound loans to their customers.

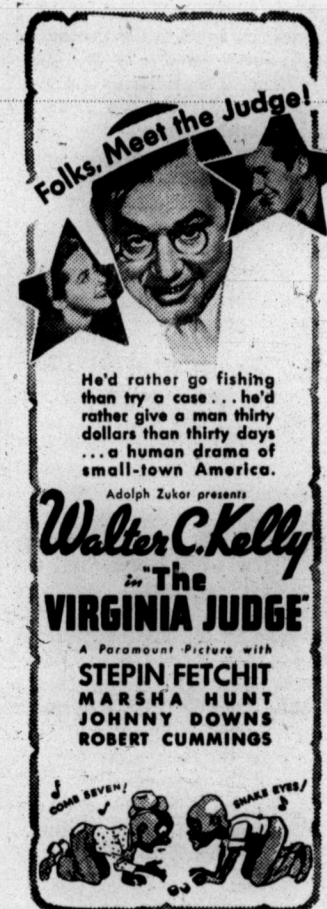

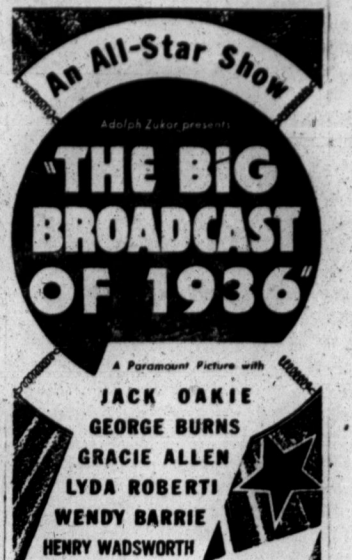
