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COCKE OPPOSES FUND DIVERSION

Citizens Road League Denounces Use Of Highway For Other Purposes

Diversion of highway funds was denounced as unfair, inequitable and illogical in a statement issued today by William F. Cocke, vice chairman of the Prince William County Unit of the Citizens Road League of Virginia.

"Let our General Assembly beware of any reasoning toward the diversion of the motor vehicle license or gas tax revenue to any cause other than the support of our highway system, no matter how worthy the cause may be," Cocke said. "It would be unfair, inequitable and illogical to divert money collected by these means to any use other than for the direct benefit of the property from which the revenue is derived, which in this case is the motor vehicle."

Mr. Cocke, who is also town manager of Manassas, said that it has been customary to refer to motor vehicle owners as motorists, but when this term is used it tends to bring to mind a rather affluent, leisure class whose principal use of the motor vehicle is for pleasure.

"It is probable that the term had its origin back in the days when it was a fact that the motor vehicle was strictly a rich man's toy," he said, "but today the motor vehicle has become almost entirely utilitarian and is a part of the economic life of the poor man as well as the rich."

Continuing further, he said the motor fuel tax is probably the most equitable form of taxation ever devised for raising revenue for highway purposes. "However, a sales tax of from 35 to 60 per cent can only be justified by the fact that the money so derived is to be expended for the direct benefit of the equipment using this highly taxed product. Divert even a small per cent of this tax to purposes other than highway construction and maintenance and there is at once created a condition which is economically illogical, and a precedent is set for confiscatory taxation along other lines."

In concluding his statement, Mr. Cocke said that the motor vehicle is a necessity to people rich or poor, in every walk of life, and that the person buying a car solely for pleasure driving is today almost as rare as the motoring veils and dusters of 1910.

The evening proved to be one of both inspiration and recreation.

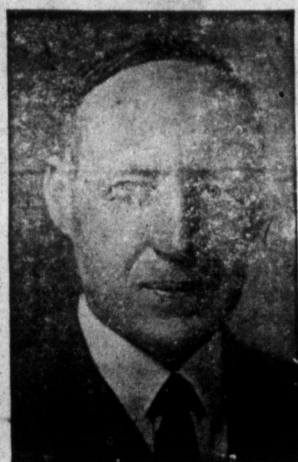

NEW FORD TRACTOR DEALER APPOINTED

Mr. H. A. Wilson has been appointed Prince William County dealer for the new Ford tractor and Ferguson wheelless implements, it was announced this week.

"Farmers who have seen the new type mechanized farm equipment in action at demonstrations are impressed with its capacity for hard work of all types although it is much lighter in weight than other tractors capable of equal work," Mr. Wilson said. "It weighs approximately 2,000 pounds but plows two 14-inch furrows with ease and uses only one gallon of fuel an hour under difficult soil conditions."

"The tractor and unit implements are so closely coupled that they can actually work in small, irregular fields and corners too small for horses. Due to the unit and the fact that the combination has an extremely low center of gravity, the new Ford tractor out-performs horses on hills. The linkage involved in the Ferguson System is such that the front wheels are kept on the ground no matter how steep the grade."

"The unique coupling between the tractor and implement combined with the Ferguson System of hydraulic control contributes largely to the efficiency of the unit. The wheelless implements can be attached or detached in less than a minute without using tools and there is little to do except steer the tractor even when cultivating or plowing. The implement keeps at a constant depth in the ground no matter how rough the surface of the field."

T. B. SEAL CHAIRMAN NAMES STATE COMMITTEE

To support measures which will be offered next month in the General Assembly to further the cause of tuberculosis control throughout the State, J. Vaughan Gary, president of the Virginia Tuberculosis Association, has appointed Thomas C. Boushall, of Richmond, chairman of a legislative committee to sponsor recommendations which will be laid before the lawmakers.

Under resolutions adopted at the last annual meeting of his Association, Mr. Gary was requested to name a committee, of which he was to serve as a member. Committee members chosen by Mr. Gary are:

Dr. C. L. Harrell, Norfolk; Mr. William N. Neff, Abingdon; Dr. Charles P. Cake, Arlington County; Senator Jeff F. Walter, Accomack County; Mrs. George Sloane, Warren; Dr. Frank S. Johns; Dr. Dean B. Cole; Mr. H. Laurie Smith; Miss Ellen H. Smith, and Mr. Boushall, all of Richmond.

A preliminary meeting of the Legislative Committee was held in Richmond last week, at which time tentative recommendations to be submitted to the Legislature were discussed.

Miss Leslie Combs Foster, executive secretary of the Virginia Tuberculosis Association, reviewed activities for the control of tuberculosis sponsored by her association during recent months. In that period, the association and its affiliated organizations and auxiliaries sponsored 73 public meetings, which drew an attendance of more than 7,000 persons. Field workers of the association paid 224 visits to counties and 39 cities.

Prior to the start of the present Christmas Seal Sale Campaign, eleven regional meetings were held in various sections of the State. Indicating the magnitude of the drive in Virginia, Miss Foster reported that the demands for seals and other supplies incident to the fund-raising campaign were hard to meet. Richmond headquarters of the association distributed 41,560,000 seals; 426,000 bangle pins and 2,600 Christmas Seal bonds in various denominations.

GARDEN WEEK

Plans for Garden week in Virginia, April 22 to 27, 1940, were perfected in Richmond this week by presidents and representatives of thirty member clubs of the Garden Club of Virginia. Lists of homes to be shown next year, new policies concerning garden tours, etc., were discussed and officials of the Garden Week Committee were announced.

Plans discussed at the conference in Richmond included a revision of this list to include additional places of general interest and an improvement in the reception and care of visitors by garden club officials in charge during the week at the various estates.

SMITH COMMITTEE BEGINS HEARINGS

National Labor Relations Board Must Explain Unfair Actions

The special Committee of the House of Representatives, headed by Hon. Howard Smith, of Virginia, began its investigation of the National Labor Relations Board on Monday. Judge Smith, a national figure, was chiefly responsible for the legislation authorizing this investigation, and its head is expected to reveal in a strictly judicial manner the inner working of the N. L. R. B.

The National Labor Relations Board has been widely characterized as a combined judge, jury and executioner in matters touching the enforcement of the Wagner Labor Act. Only one element of American life was represented in the selected personnel of the Board, that of radical, communistic labor, and the employer, under this on-sided exercise of governmental authority did not have a chance.

Finally the high-handed, Un-American methods of this European-minded tribunal became so obnoxious that the Administration became unable to stem the rising tide of indignation throughout the Nation and the investigation was ordered by Congress, where a "white-wash" investigation was already under way under a set-up by which radical labor was practically being allowed to investigate itself.

As in the case of the Dies Committee, the Administration in Washington has made a determined effort to protect Un-American activities throughout the country, but could not, apparently, upset Congressional precedent which placed the Chairman-ship of an investigating committee in the hands of the author of the legislation. Thus the present investigation fell into the hands of the legislation. Thus the present investigation fell into the hands of Judge Smith, a fair minded jurist, whose legal experience and abilities will make it unlikely that he will be eld into un-judicial methods such as has weakened the fine work of the Dies Committee, and America may expect to see a calm-minded and absolutely fair investigation.

It is believed in some quarters that the effort to pack the Committee with men favorable to radical labor has to some extent affected the present set-up, but the strong Chairman-ship is expected to overcome to a great degree any favoritism which may exist in the Committee and re-which will be calculated to correct suit in recommendations to Congress existing abuses of power without subjecting anybody to abuse.

The other members of the Committee are Hon. Charles A. Halleck of Indiana and Hon. Harry N. Routzohn, of Ohio, Republicans, and Hon. Arthur D. Healey, of Massachusetts and Hon. Abe Murdock, of Utah, Democrats, and, of course, our own Hon. Howard Smith, as Chairman.

Led by coach "Herb" Saunders, the firemen, hit their stride in the last half to overcome an eight point lead held by Fort Myer and at the end of the game favored the score tied at 30 to 30. The Fort Myer five refused to play the tie off and Manassas was awarded the game by a forfeit.

Dear Sir:

Now that work has been begun substantially on Route 234 from Dumfries to In. Hill and after that is completed, a continuation of that work on from Independent Hill to Lake Jackson, I do not feel that the members of the Battlefield Trail Highway Association nor the many other people who feel a deep interest in the construction and completion of this road ought to let up for a moment in their efforts with the State Highway Commission in urging and fighting for the continuation of this route from Manassas to Gilbert's Filling Station.

As you know the object of the above-named Association and many others is to work for the completion of this entire route 234 and our goal will not be obtained until allocations of funds are made in the future for the completion of this route.

We are all inclined to rest on our cars when we see substantial construction going on such as is now being done on the southern end of this route, and in my opinion it would be fatal should we not continue this effort each year and present our claims to the Highway Commission at the proper times.

The Battlefield Trail Highway Association has not had a meeting for some time, and it would seem to me that early in the coming spring all persons interested in the further construction of this road should get together again in Manassas and lay plans for the future, and I am sure that Mr. C. C. Cloe, the President of this Association, will be glad to call such a meeting at the proper time.

As Treasurer of this Association, I have never had an opportunity to exhibit my account to the Associ-

ation and I would be glad if you would publish the following figures: I have collected in memberships of \$1.00 each covering the period from October 29, 1936 to the present date, the sum of \$76.00. From that amount the following expenditures have been made by order of the President:

4. November 2, 1938-to Stratford Hotel, Fredericksburg Virginia for dinner for delegation to meeting of Highway Commission	\$39.80
Total	\$47.80
