### Let's Save Lives on the Road

Now that the summer vacation season is over and you have escaped death on the highway, it might not be amiss to think again the old warning that careful driving is what the nation needs if it is to reduce the horrible cost of speed on the highways.

One hundred Americans a day is too high a price to pay for modern transportation. It is remarkable that the public is so apathetic to the loss of life and that the injured are hardly noticed by the public. If some strange, unknown disease was taking a hundred victims a day in the United States, there would be a hysterical reign of terror throughout the land.

Manassas, like every other community, wishes its quota of victims of the automobile-highway toll every year. With the best intentions we continue to permit drunken drivers to operate cars and get free when apprehended. We like to think that we can violate traffic regulations without having to pay the penalty. In time, however, that we lost this foolish notion.

Rigid enforcement of every traffic regulation, with stiff fines imposed for minor violations, would do much to make the average automobile driver safety conscious. Let's support the work of the traffic policemen and give them the satisfaction of knowing that we are behind them when they arrest careless and reckless drivers.

### Dissipating U. S. Resources

"There are definite limits to the American resources which we can safely invest in foreign aid," declares Senator Arthur Vandenberg, in an appeal to the Western European nations to develop greater self-sufficiency and greater cooperation among themselves.

Mr. Vandenberg stressed the importance of our "weakened strength" as an asset common to all the Western democracies but also pointed out that indefinite dissipation of American resources would not be in the interest of the other democracies or our own.

While Mr. Vandenberg did not give figures on the excess of exports from this country over imports from other countries, he plainly had these figures in mind. For a number of years, the United States has been shipping valuable material resources to other countries without return, offsetting resources from other countries. If this process keeps up long enough, the United States will inevitably exhaust its resources.

It would be better for the United States, in exchange for its material resources, to get something tangible from other countries. The fact that they owe us the balance and will pay it if they can is not enough. No nation can build anything, in peace or in war, on the unpaid balances of its friends. Material resources are the backbone of the economic power of any country and economic power is the backbone of military strength.

### Free Press Insures Freedom

Adolph Hitler was a smart man. One of the first things he did when he took over Germany was to give Goebbels the power to suppress the news. Then when he purged loyal Germans who were unfaithful Nazis, the people heard only his side of the story. And for all the years that Hitler was in power, all the newspapers under his control printed only what he permitted.

In this respect Hitler was a smart man. He knew that he could never keep his hold on the people if they had access to the truth.

Every dictator and bigot knows the same, whether in foreign lands or in our town. Freedom cannot exist without the free exchange of facts and ideas. And as long as our newspapers remain uncensored as they are now, all the facts on both sides of any controversy will be presented to you, the freest people in the world.

There are those who criticize the press, saying that it is censored; that it is not free to publish both sides of an argument because it is controlled by special interests. But oftentimes this criticism is really a tribute to the freedom that our newspapers enjoy. For nine times out of ten, those who criticize have an axe to grind themselves, and are disturbed that the press does not cater to them.

In Prince William County anyone who has a legitimate story to tell will find these pages open for the facts. And if a dispute arises concerning those facts, the other side of the story will be told too. For we editors know, from the experience of others in totalitarian lands, that suppression of the news breeds "smart men" like Adolph Hitler.

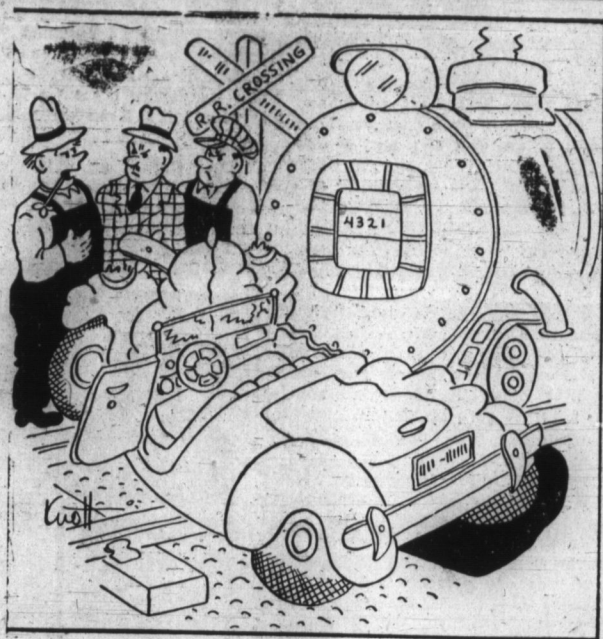

### 2,4-D Sprays Are Dangerous

Blacksburg.—Failure to take precautions with sprayers that once have contained 2, 4-D, the chemical and killer, may result in damage to grain crops.

This warning comes from specialists from V. P. I. who say recently tomatoes, beans and grapes have been sent to college laboratories for diagnosis of a "new plant disease," which turned out to be 2, 4-D injury.

They recommend setting aside a sprayer for use exclusively with 2, 4-D, and that it not be washed and re-used with other spray materials.

However, if it is necessary for any reason to use a sprayer first with 2, 4-D, and then with other materials, follow this cleaning procedure.

and add household ammonia at the rate of at least two teaspoonfuls per quart of water. Spray out a small amount of the mixture, and leave the remainder in the tank overnight. If cold water has been used, double or triple the soaking period. Drain the tank and rinse several times with hot, soapy water, being sure to spray a small amount through the nozzle each time.

The specialists say that in many cases, drifting vapor from the aster form of 2, 4-D used on lawns has caused damage to gardens from 25 to 50 feet away.

An enormous number of customers are telling our store managers and clerks that they want to continue to enjoy our low prices for quality foods.

Farmers and other suppliers are asking what they can do to preserve this efficient outlet for their products.

Our 110,000 employees are asking us to protect their jobs and pensions.

Labor leaders are wiring us their opposition to this threat to labor's living standards.

If all these people will be hurt, why then do the anti-trust lawyers want to put A&P out of business?

## Low Prices Don't Hurt Anyone

The anti-trust lawyers say because we are able to sell food cheaper than other grocers, we make it impossible for those grocers to compete with us.

If this were true, we should have all the food business in the United States by this time.

Just the opposite is true. In 1933 we had 11.6 per cent of the nation's food business. Now, according to the anti-trust lawyers, our share has decreased to 6.4 per cent in 1948. Anyone can see we have nothing even approaching a monopoly.

There are about 275 more food chains in business today than there were ten years ago.

A proposed new sewerage disposal ordinance having been proposed for adoption by this Board, and a hearing having been set for this 8th day of September, 1949; and the matter this day having come on for such hearing with the result that a substantial representation has requested that action thereon be deferred until the October 6, 1949 meeting of this Board;

It is accordingly ordered that such hearing be and the same hereby is postponed until two o'clock p. m., E.S.T., on October 6, 1949 in the Courtroom of the Prince William County Courthouse, before this Board, and the Clerk is hereby directed to cause this resolution with the full text of the proposed ordinance appended, to be published for two successive weeks in The Manassas Messenger and The Manassas Journal, newspapers of general circulation in Prince William County, Virginia.

## LEGAL

### RECOMMENDED SEWAGE DISPOSAL ORDINANCE.

An ordinance regulating the disposal of human waste and excrements and to prevent pollution of streams in the County of ..... Virginia, prescribing certain types of privies and septic tank systems and the design, location and capacity of same; requiring any person, firm or corporation to first obtain a permit from the Health Department to conduct such business; requiring the owner, and/or user of any flush toilet system to connect to a public or private sewer, if same is available; requiring permits to install or repair septic tank systems and providing punishment for failure to comply with said ordinance.

**SECTION I.** It shall be unlawful for the owner of any house used as a human habitation, any warehouse, and public building, or other place where human beings congregate or are employed in the County of ..... to use or occupy; or, to rent; or lease the same for use or occupancy by any person, firm or corporation, or for any person, firm or corporation to use or occupy the same unless and until the said house or building shall have been supplied or equipped with an approved method of disposal of human excrement of such construction as will comply with the requirements hereinafter designated.

**SECTION II.** That for the purpose of this ordinance "An approved method of disposal of human excrement" shall be deemed to be either: a) A properly installed flush toilet connected to an approved public or private sewer. If a public or private sewer is available to the property owner, the owner will be required to connect to the public or private sewer if the owner of the latter permits such connection; (b) A properly connected flush toilet connected to an approved, properly installed septic tank system or an approved sand filter or other types of approved secondary sewage disposal and/or treatment; (c) A standard pit privy of concrete, or double wood construction.

The terms "properly installed," "approved," and "standard" as used in this ordinance shall be construed to mean "in accordance with the specifications set forth in the current septic tank or pit privy bulletin of the State Health Department." The term Health Department shall mean County Health Officer or his duly authorized representative.

**SECTION III.** (a) It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to install or repair; have installed or repaired; allow to be installed or repaired; or contract to install or repair a septic tank for another person, firm, or corporation, before the owner of the property on which the septic tank is to be installed or repaired, obtains a permit from the Health Officer of the ..... County Health Department, or his agent.

(b) The permit shall specify the minimum capacity and amount of drain tile, and designate the approximate location of the septic tank.

**SECTION IV.** No part of any septic tank system shall be covered or put into use until completed, inspected and approved by the Health Officer of the ..... County Health Department, or his authorized agent.

**SECTION V.** If upon any inspection, the Health Officer or his authorized agent shall find any violation of this ordinance and/or the provisions of the permit issued under it, he shall direct the person, firm or corporation to whom the permit was issued, by written notice, to make the necessary corrections, within such reasonable time as shall be specified therein.

**SECTION VI.** It shall be unlawful for any owner or any tenant or lessee of any premises properly supplied with a sanitary privy or flush toilet or other approved device for the disposal of human excrement of misuse or neglect the same, so as to allow or cause it to cease to be sanitary.

**SECTION VII.** It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to start construction work in any new sub-division, or housing development before furnishing in triplicate plans and specifications of the sewer system or sewage disposal system to be used together with plans for the anticipated water system to be used in the structure or structures. These plans and specifications shall conform to the requirements of Section II of this ordinance and must be approved by the Health Officer, or his agent, of the ..... County Health Department before construction is started.

**SECTION VIII.** Any person, firm, or corporation contracting to install, repair or clean septic tanks in ..... County for another person, firm, or corporation shall first obtain a permit to do such work. To obtain a permit the person, firm, or corporation shall apply to the Health Department of the ..... County. The permit will be issued at no cost to the applicant, if the applicant appears to be qualified and equipped to do such work.

Permits shall be renewed annually and a permit may be revoked for failure to comply satisfactorily with this ordinance.

**SECTION IX.** Any person, firm or corporation that cleans any septic tank shall dispose of the sludge and material removed from any septic tank by depositing such sludge and material into a sewage treatment plant or a sewage system that leads to same; or, by depositing under the surface of the ground in a manner that does not endanger any source of drinking water and is not accessible to flies.

**SECTION X.** Any person, firm, or corporation who shall neglect, fail or refuse to comply with the provisions of this ordinance; the permit issued under it as provided in Section III; or the written notice within the time specified in such notice as provided in Section V, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor; and, shall be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$25.00; and, each day's continuance to so violate this ordinance or any of its provisions shall constitute a separate offense.

**SECTION XI.** All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict with provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION XII.** Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of said ordinance shall not be affected thereby.
