acreage allotments, to be issued at a later date, will be in force. This announcement was received by the local office of the Produc-tion and Marketing Administration from R. B. Bridgforth, PMA State

Bridgforth pointed out that pres ent law requires that marketing quotas be proclaimed when the tota supply of wheat exceeds the normal supply by more than 20 per cent, or when the average monthly farm price of wheat for three successive months has not been more than 66 per cent of parity.

Neither of these conditions exists, Bridgforth said, largely because farmers generally cooperated by planting within acreage allotments in 1950, thus keeping supplies and demand in balance. He also noted that prices held well above the min-mum of 66 per cent of parity because farmers put a substantial part of their 1949 wheat under price sup-

If wheat growers generally plant within their 1951 acreage allotments, as they did for the current 1950 crop, Bridgforth considered it possible to continue to avoid marketing quotas in the future.

The Chairman explained that under a marketing quota program, growers are subject to strict penalties on any crop marketed in excess of the production from the allotted farm acreage. Under the acreage allotment plan, there are no marketing penalties and growers who exceed their alloted acreage are not eligible for price support.

Legislation under which wheat acreage allotments are established requires that they be proclaimed each year by the Secretary of Agriculture unless a national emergency exists. The 1951 national allotment will be based on estimated needs for the coming year after making. for the coming year after making allowance for the supply of wheat on hand on July 1, 1930. Announce-ment of the 1951 wheat allotment will probably be made about mid-

Meanwhile, Bridgforth said that Virginia counties are now about to commence work on setting up acre-age allotments for the 1951 wheat crop and that individual farm alotmen's will be made at a later late, but well in advance of seeding

As many as 800 violators a week have been arrested at the permanent weighing station at Woodbridge since the station opened July 1. Many paid fines on the spot but 150 cases came before Trial Justice Compton on Mondaymorning of this week. The fines imposed by the trial justice ranged from \$5 to \$100. Police have informed Justice Compton that he may expect to have as many as 200 cases a week between now and August 1. Trial Justice court is held Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week.

Virginia law sets the maximum load for trucks at 18,000 pounds per axle or 40,000 pounds for a four axle or more vehicle. Under this law, which became effective July 1, truckers are liable to fines of 2 cents per pound overload if less than 5,000 pounds and 5 cents a pound of overload if more than 5,000 pounds.

Many truckers unable to pay fines at the weighing station have been sent to jail and as a result the larger trucking companies are posting bonds to insure the release of


