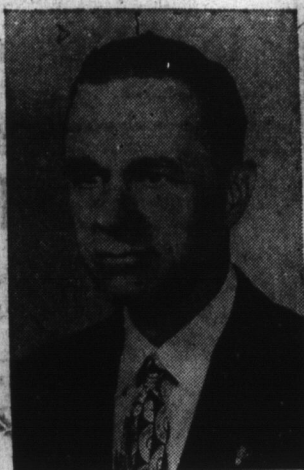

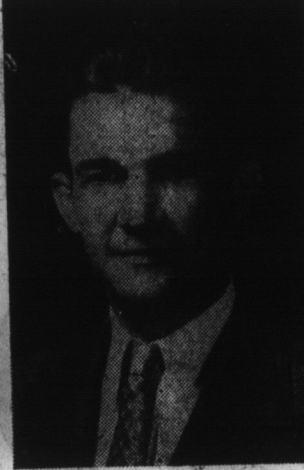
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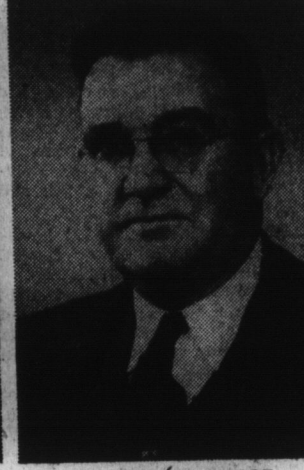

The group will meet at the Osbourn High School gym at 8 a. m. sharp (Daylight Time) each morning next week, Monday through Friday.

### It's 'Work Day' At Recreation Park Saturday

Saturday will be "work day" at the "work day" at the Manassas Recreation Association Park, according to plans worked out by the Manassas Lions Club as a means of clearing up the popular recreation center.

Members of the club will don overalls and old clothes to put the park, located on the Centreville road, in A-1 shape. Repairs will be made and rubbish removed from the park area. All citizens are urged to cooperate in the project and volunteers are sought to assist in the work which will get under way at 8 a. m.

The park was started by the Lions Club a few years ago and then turned over to the Manassas Recreation Association.  
Some recent abuses of the facilities at the park have been broken down, tearing down of electric wires and the accumulation of rubbish left by those who use the picnic tables.

At a meeting of the Lions Club last night, it was voted to turn over the proceeds from the Lions-Kiwanis dance amounting to \$57.33, to the Recreation Association. A softball game planned by the two clubs on September 7th is being held to raise additional money, which will also be donated to the Recreation Association.

Odie Breeden, Jr. was accepted as a new member of the club.  
Conway Seely, of Manassas, mounted on Gayline, rode off with the Bull Run Hunt Club trophy for the third consecutive year at the annual Horse Show held here Sunday on the grounds of the Porter estate.

The presentation of a handsome trophy to Mr. Seely was made by Mrs. Amelia Brown McBryde at the conclusion of the show, which attracted a large number of entries and a crowd of several hundred.

Ginger, owned by Manley Carter of Orange, took first place in three of the hunter events, coming out champion with 12½ points. Another horse of Mr. Carter's, Your Beau, also won a blue ribbon in the Hunter Hack.

Mrs. Cheever McKee's Crackerjack, of Silver Spring, Maryland, was king of the jumpers, placing first in two classes, with a total of 11½ points. Another blue ribbon winner in two events was Jean Cochran's entry, Tempting Fox.

Many other beautiful mounts were shown in this yearly show, making the presentation of ribbons quite well distributed.  
The show, sponsored by the American Legion Post and Legion Auxiliary, was under the chairmanship of J. Carl Kincheloe. It proved a great success and was enjoyed by the large number attending.

### Record Primary Vote Cast in County; Wheeling Wins For Sheriff; Kincheloe For Supervisor By a Handsome Majority

Prince William voters went to the polls in record-breaking numbers Tuesday to set a new high for a Primary Election, with a total of 2351 ballots cast, exceeding any previous primary contest by over two hundred votes.

With a three-cornered sheriff contest, hotly contested races for supervisor in five districts and a bitter two-way battle for State Senator, a steady stream of voters visited the polls throughout the day.

**Wheeling Victor**  
Turner D. Wheeling, former deputy sheriff, wrested the nomination for sheriff from the incumbent, Sheriff John D. Kerlin, by the margin of 125 votes. H. Layton Laws, the other contestant in the race, ran a strong third.  
Manassas, Dumfries, Ocoquan and Haymarket precincts turned the tide for Wheeling where he received strong support. Until the Manassas vote was counted Kerlin was leading by about 40 votes. Wheeling captured Manassas by over 100 votes. Potomac went

strongest for Kerlin, where he had a plurality of 105 votes.  
**Big Vote For Kincheloe**  
Supervisor J. Carl Kincheloe won an overwhelming and decisive victory in his three-cornered fight for re-nomination against Wheatley M. Johnson, former supervisor, and Roy Helms, a newcomer to local politics. Kincheloe took both precincts, by wide margins. Of a total of 900 votes cast, a new high for a Manassas primary, the victor polled 516 votes as compared to 197 for Johnson and 187 for Helms.  
**Hall Beats Garber**  
Supervisor R. S. Hall was successful in his bid for re-nomination from Ocoquan district defeating Manley Garber, young Woodbridge farmer, by a count of 223 to 161. Hall's margin of victory was greater than in 1947, when he won out 285 to 198. The vote here was lighter this year by about 100 votes.

**Close at Gainesville**  
It was nip-and-tuck in Gainesville district, where Supervisor R. B. Gossom was successful against C. B. Roland, winning by only 11 votes. Gossom captured three out of four precincts, his biggest lead being in his home precinct of Waterfall, which he won 15-4. Roland won in Catharpin, 24 to 16. There was only three votes difference in Haymarket, which gave Gossom 73 to Roland's 70.

**Big Upset at Coles**  
Biggest upset was Bradford Lowe's victory in Coles district. Here Lowe won out over Supervisor J. Murray Taylor, chairman of the Board, and Andrew Samsky, third contender, in a close race.  
In the two precincts, Lowe came through with 56 votes against 50 for Taylor and 45 for Samsky. Deciding factor was Token precinct which gave Lowe 38 votes out of a total of 59 cast. Samsky won in Independent Hill precinct by 4 votes. Token, like some other small precincts, had to put in a hurried call for more ballots because of the heavy voting.

**Coffey By 8 Votes**  
It was another close contest in Dumfries district, where Francis M. Coffey won the nomination over Col. James E. Kerr by the small margin of 8 votes. Coffey polled 163 votes to 155 for Kerr, with the latter taking Joplin precinct, 8 to 1, while Coffey came out ahead in Dumfries by one vote and in Potomac by 16 votes.

Kerr has stated he would protest the election, charging voting law violations. He claimed that he or his representative was not permitted to examine the ballot box prior to the opening of the polls, nor permitted to challenge prospective voters.  
The winner meets Supervisor Jack Pick, independent, in the November general election.

**Local Boy Chosen For National FFA Band**  
WALLACE WRIGHT, son of Mrs. Anna Wright of Yorktown, has been selected one of the three boys in the state to be in the 1951 National FFA Band. As members of the National FFA Band these boys will attend the National FFA Convention from October 8-11 at Kansas City, Missouri. He is a member of the Harry Sanders FFA Chapter.

Wallace was graduated from Osbourn High School in June 1951, and had made an excellent record in the high school band for four years. Wallace was also selected from the state last year as a member of the National FFA Band. He will play the 3rd Bb trumpet.

**Man Found Dead on Step Of Home Here**  
Allen Payne, about 40 years old, was found dead early this morning at the entrance of his rooming house on East Center street.  
The man was badly injured about the mouth and face, having apparently fallen on the step in either entering or leaving the house.  
The body was discovered by his landlady, Mrs. Cordelia Collins, who immediately called police. Police Officer Dennis Colbert investigated and the condition of the man's face indicated at first that he might have been the victim of foul play.  
Dr. John Ringler was summoned and in turn called Corner Martin, who rendered a verdict of death from natural causes.  
Payne was an employee of the Herbert Bryant Feed Mill here and was well-known in Manassas and vicinity.

**WINS BY 3 VOTES**  
Stuart DeBell won out for supervisor by three votes in the Centreville district race. His vote was 190 to 187 for incumbent, Robert R. Dye. A third candidate, Howard H. Hevener, received 93 votes.

**4-H GIRLS TO POWELL'S FORT**

### Donovan Is Victor By Over 100 Votes

Unofficial count shows John A. K. Donovan winner over State Senator Andrew W. Clarke by 101 votes in one of the closest primary senate fights in years.

Although Clarke carried Prince William County, 1241 to 1045, the Manassas vote swung the tide that decided the outcome by giving Donovan a majority of 99 votes, or only two votes less than the winner's total lead over his opponent.

It was well after midnight before the Manassas returns were to assure Donovan's victory, who was trailing slightly elsewhere.

As a result Manassas was the focal point in the race until the wee small hours of the morning. Local strength for Donovan was evident from the start with many bolting the organization to back Donovan, largely in protest against Senator Clarke and his failure to support Prince William in getting the circuit judgeship.

More than 15,000 votes were cast in the contest.

### Cattle Thefts In Catharpin Are Reported

A purebred Aberdeen-Angus bull, valued at \$1,000, and two purebred calves worth \$200, have been missed recently from the herd of John F. Garrett, owner of Mt. Pleasant Farm, at Catharpin, Va.  
Mr. Garrett is of the belief that the animals were stolen by rustlers, which from time to time have been active in this area. The calves were taken about two months ago and the bull was missed three weeks ago.

Hinges had been removed from the gate to the field where the cattle are pastured. The field is some distance from the main highway, making it easy for the rustlers to drive up with a truck unseen and make way with the cattle.

The loss of the cattle has been reported to the sheriff's department by Owner Garrett, who offers a \$100 reward for any information leading to the conviction of the thieves. Tatoo numbers on the missing bull's ears are XJA and 290.

### Busy Filling Teacher Posts For Fall Term

With only a month to go before school opening on September 8th, the most urgent problem confronting county school authorities is the filling of existing vacancies in the teaching staff.

Joseph M. Garber, who assumed new duties as superintendent of schools on August 1st, has found himself faced with securing teachers for approximately 17 elementary and 6 high school vacancies, and he then has been busy interviewing applicants for teacher jobs.

In their first meeting with Superintendent Garber, the school board members agreed that meeting the teacher problem should be the first order of business.

Building projects and repairs also confront the Board, which is attempting to work with architects and builders difficulties arising in the letting of contracts for the Ocoquan Elementary School and other needed constructions.

Bids for the replacement of the heating system at Osbourn High School, according to specifications drawn up by E. D. Gothwaite, heating engineer, will be received when the Board meets in special session on August 16th. Bids are also being received for the construction project at Nokesville.

### LEGAL NOTICES

#### REGULATION 9, G. 7-51 A REGULATION REQUIRING THE TAGGING OF WILD TURKEYS.

Pursuant to a proposal authorized by the Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries June 8, 1951 published as required by law, the following regulation was adopted at a meeting of this Commission at Richmond, Virginia, July 27, 1951.

Any person killing a wild turkey in any county shall immediately have attached thereto an official game tag.

This tag shall show the name and address of the hunter, number of hunting license and any other information that the Commission may prescribe. The Commission shall furnish such official game tags which shall be attached and checked at authorized checking stations or by representatives of the Commission. No person shall destroy the identity of any wild turkey unless and until tagged and checked as herein provided.

Any wild turkey not tagged as herein provided found in the possession of any person shall be forfeited to the Commonwealth to be disposed of as provided by law.

All regulations or parts of regulations in conflict with the foregoing are hereby rescinded.

This regulation shall become effective August 20, 1951.

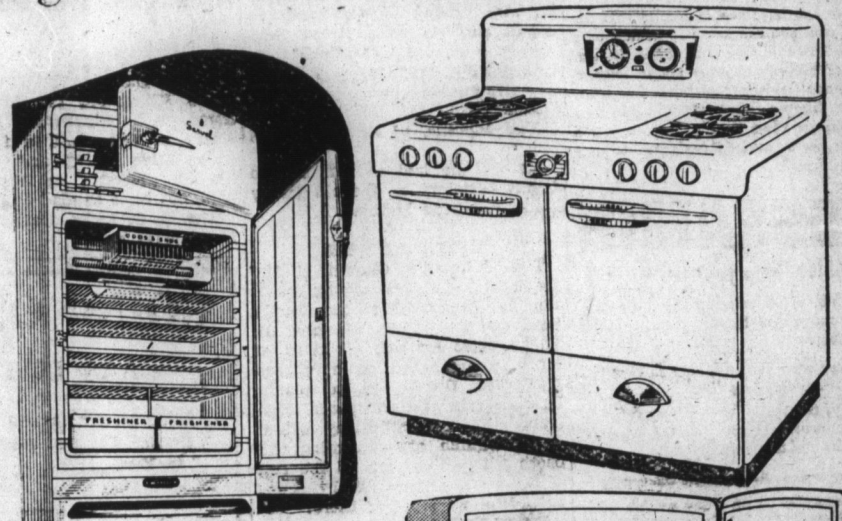

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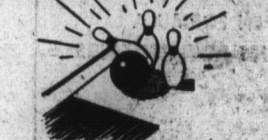

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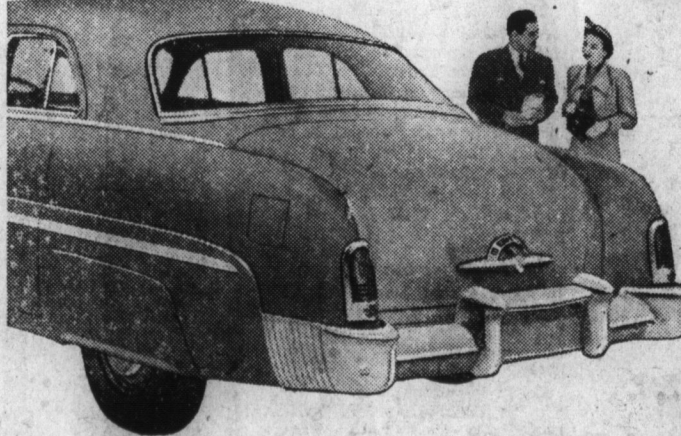
