

dred or more manage that fused; but the cheerful part of this business is this: if we can control the codling moth, the curculios, the scales, the aphis, the scab and rots, we incidentally control about everything else.

In spraying we have to combat the chewing insects like the codling moth, the curculios and the currant worm with stomach poisons and we use arsenate of lead. For sucking insects like the scales and aphis we must use the brood of worms come along in July caustic sprays like lime sulphur or tobacco extract. . For the parasitic fungous diseases like the apple scab, mildew of the grape and black knot of the plum we use bordeau mixture or foods on the growing bu lime sulphur. For the bacterial diseases like pear blight and peach yellows we do not use a spray. We can skin and leaves the egg.
