the intestines they make small ulcers and send out a poison through the body. It is spread by food, drinks, dirty fingers and No public demonstration other things that may have germs on them which get into the mouth.

> Flies have a great deal to do apreeding 1 walk on dirty things that have typhoid germs on them, then they walk on food and other things that people eat. The only way that the germs can get out of the body is through the bow el discharges of the body.




