



A BOUQUET TO OUR MILK PRO-**DUCERS**

Prince William dairymen, in common with other milk producers of nearby Virginia and Maryland, may share particular pride in the statement of Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, pure food expert, that Washington has the best milk supply in the United States. Dr. Wiley, according to his own statement, which is readily endorsed, spoke with authority, not only because of his health activities, but because he has been a farmer for seventy-five

Dr. Wiley is therefore able to understand the difficulties as well as the benefits of the business of milk production. In the six years he has been on his dairy farm in Virginia, he estimates his loss from tubercular cows at \$2,000. He is still heartily engaged in the business and confesses to the refreshing belief that he is paying off a debt to humanity by producing pure milk.

ANOTHER FAIRY TALE

The story about the "youngest son of President Monroe being still alive and enjoying the best of health at Jacksonville, Fla., at the age of 103 years, has started on its rounds again," says the editor of the Fairfax Herald, who proceeds to give conclusive evidence that it is a passing bit of fiction, and nothing more. The story, which started this time in the country correspondence of the Fredericksburg Free Lance, was copied by this paper and others in this section of Virginia, who were interested in its appearance in the Free Lance and who were not sufficiently familiar with the personal history of President Monroe to question it.

"There is undoubtedly an individual who calls himself Major Edward James Monroe, who lives in a little houseboat on the St. John's river at Jacksonville, Fla., who claims to be the youngest son of President Monroe and whose mother, he alleges, was the third wife of President Monroe," says the Herald. "but if our conte will consult the 'Life of President Monroe' by Daniel C. Gilman, or any other recognized authority, he will find that President Monroe was married only once." President Monroe, according to history, had only two children and these were girls.

While these figures are not expected to check the tide of criticism, they will show something of the scale on which "Y" work was conducted, which in itself provides ample room for criticism granted that even a small percentage of workers may be honestly rated wanting. 
