There are two main schools of thought on this subject - the radical and conservative. The radical would have the Federal Government borrow money on its bonds and make loans directly to the farmer at 4 per cent., or even less. This is the extreme of socalled government aid. The conservatives would provide a system of land banks, bringing the farmer and the investor together. for their mutual profit and adventere but providing no gov-Wyrnment aid.

It increases the cost of living and causes a onesided development. Most civilged nations are already offering direct aid and other inducements to persuade people back to the land. They are the ones who oftentimes say, "My, our town is dead; there's nothing to do." Perhaps they may be true in this respect inasmuch as conditions seem to bear them out in the statement. They must take to the streets and seek amusement in any form, whether it is good or eyil in its influence. There are several ways that me sowns drave been able to remedy the bad habit that their lives have failen into-the habit of idleness. A public library, not built by a whiinnthregists but arranged for in an economical and yet astisfactory manner by the name of the towns, was one of the solutions. A number of people domiced their books for this purpose. In other towns the churches opened the doors that were closed on almost every day, except Sunday, and provided barmless entertainments and amusements. Boys' clubs were organized by prominent men of the communities and, here many gathered to hear talks of interest from business men, to read the magazines and newspapers, or to include in various forms of recreation. It was found to he the destroyer of the evil habit of idleness that had permented the young means. We were prior to that. The girls were not left out in this development of better living. Where before they had no place to go for amusement the towns took up the question, bringing together socially the boys and girls, and offering them various forms of amusement. In those communities that did these things, few of the young people care about leaving their towns to seek amusement in the city; each inwa individually got together and appolied the

Manuter county, Fig., built dillyfour miles of macadam and shell road. From 1911 to 1912 land on the road increased in value \$20 per scre, and land increase of \$10 per acre.

Spottsylvania county, Vil., improve forty-one miles of road, and land which formerly sold on an average of \$24.74 Charges Danies William Date William an average of \$41.74 per acre.

Hans Garbus, a German farmer of lows, has discovered that the benefits which appear on the surface as attached to the mail order plan sometimes spell disaster and has written a very interesting stery of his views in a certain farm paper. Here is a part of

"We farmers need awakening to the fact that we have unmiswe must think and plan. I am one of the slow German farmers others may profit, for knowledge

Twenty-nine years ago I began my farm career. I had an old team and \$50. Our furniture was mostly home-made-chairs, cupboard and lounge made from dry goods boxes, neatly covered with ten-cent cretonne by my girl wife. We rented eighty acres. Being a bey of good habits I got all needed machinery and groceries of 'our home merchants on credit, until fall cross were sold. The first year was a wet season and I did not make enough to pay creditors. I went to each on date of promise and explained conditions, paying as much as possible. and they all carried the balance over another year. They continued to accommodate me until I was able to buy a forty-acre piece of my own.

'As soon as I owned these few acres the mail order houses began sending me catalogues, and gradnally I began sending my loose change to them, letting my accounts stand in my home town where I had gotten my appear dation when I needed it.

'We then had one of the thriftiest little villages in the stategood line of busin ness in all the branches, merchants who were willing to help an hencet fellow over a bad year, and a town full of people who came twice a week to trade and vant. Our little
