This may appear to some to be an enormous quantity of corn-near forty million bushels. If this crop could be collected and placed in box cars with 1.000 bushels per car, we would have 39,380 cars or a train of corn 380 miles long, giving no room for the engines. When considered in this light, our corn crop makes a good showing, but for a moment compare it with the 300 million bushel crop of Illinois and the 389 million bushel crop of louis. which leaves a net profit on the crop of 26 cents per acre. If we consider the cost of the present corn crop of Virginia we find that every bushel of corn grown has cost us'60 cents approximately. The average price for corn in this state last December was 81 cents per bushel which gives the Virginia farmers a net profit of \$4.30 per acre for their corn crop, with

an unusual high price for corn at this time of the year. If corn production is to be made profitable, the acre production must be increased. It costs no more to cultivate an acre of good land that will produce fifty bushels of corn than it does to cultivate an acre that produces only 20 bushels. The greater the yield of corn per acre, the lower will be the cost of producing each bushel of corn. Before I go further into the discussion of this subject I want to know that every person here realizes the possibility of the soils of this state to produce corn. Can we expect large yields of corn when we go to the expense and trouble to build up our soil fertility? We most assuredly can. As an example of what can be done when scientific principles are applied to corn production I will refer you to the Boys' Corn Clubs of this state. Many boys have produced from one hundred to one hundred and seventy-five bushels of corn per acre. Culpeper county is proud of the little Utz boy who last year grew 140 bushels of corn on one acre; Shenandoah county is proud of the Tisinger boy who made his acre produce 1134 bushels of corn, and many other counties are proud to have had boys who have grown large yields of corn. ### MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS

There now confronts the citizens of Prince Wilhism county the establishment of medical inspection for the schools and a proposed medical survey. It might be well to state the facts of these two objects before making any comment. The inspection of the school would be carried on by two phy sicians, furnished by the State Board of Health the county to furnish one half, and the state the other half of the sum required to carry on this work. Their duties would be to make regular inspections of the pupils and teachers as to the general condition of their health including the ey

The survey, also prepared by the two state doctors, would go into detail in reference to the location, heating, ventilation, and lighting of each school building. Procuring the services of this inspection and survey will place Prince William fifth in the list of counties benefited by the plan.

Resisting the necessity of investigating fural school manitation the National Council of Educati of the National Education Association appointed in 1911, a committee on health problems in education. At the same time, the Council on Health and Public Instruction of the American Medical Association, appointed a committee to cooperate with the National Education Association on this subject These two committees, acting as a joint committee have for three years been working in this field and after drawing up their conclusions derived from mass of material from a careful photographic and statistical survey of about one hundred schools in four eastern states, have embedied the inform tion in a bulletin issued by the United States Bu Year of Education, entitled Rural Schoolhouses and Grounds."

Aside from the fact that many states have medical inspection of the rural schools in every district, the value of such an inspection can hardly be estinated. It is something the purents and children benefit by without any direct cost. They benefit in, that the detection of an approaching ailment may be nerceived quickly enough to ward it off. The problem of preventing epidemics in schools and closing them for months is also handled by the inspection. Prince William county should take the progressive step to back up its school officials by going half way in the matter and providing the funds to maintain the medical inspection. Other counties are doing it, other states have done it, and with Virginia, Prince William should cooperate in the HOUSE ADOPTS SEGREGATION TAX PLAN movement.




