Reports that Prices Will Reach Unprecedented Figures.

information collected by the department shows that all classes: the real facts contradict, absolutely, sensational reports that rise to unprecedented figures in the immediate future. It has even been said that a Government statistician predicted meat at 50 cents a pound and shoes at \$10 a pair within the next two years. Such a prediction, the real Government statisticians say, is quite unwarranted.

On January 1, for example, the number of beef cattle showed an increase of 3.4 per cent, over the number a year ago, and an actual increase of 1.212.000 head. It is interesting to note some statistics available on public roads of the states. South Carolina and Virginia are analogous in some respects in these statistics. Both states have a population of 47 to each mile of road and each state runs close in th number of miles of road to the square mile in area. Virginia keving 1.08 and South Carolina 1.06 South Carolina had, however, 11 per cent of its reads improved in 1912 and Virginia had 5.9 of all its reads improved. 


