

The potasa embargo will work a severe hardship on our fertilizer companies who have to move on a prearranged plan of manufacture. A number of companies anneunced months ago, shortly after the war started, that their Spring fertilizers would contain on the average of 50 per cent of normal potash content. Now, this sudden embargo on potash has made these 50 per cent potash fertilisers appear rather attractive.

Reasons for Germany's imposition of the potash embargo may be based on several conditions. One theory is, that Germany probably does not care to furnish an important plant food to raise grain crops in the United States to feed her enemies. This shows from a German standpoint, one of the most reliable from an agricultural point of view, what a valuable plant food potash is.
