## THE FARMER AN EXPERIMENTER

Some farmers would not consider it at all complimentary should you call them experimenters, but experimenters indeed are all wide-awake farmers of the present day. The man to whom present conditions are satisfying, who feels that his farm, is as productive and as paying as he cares to have it, need not bother himself about experimentation for he would not go about it in the proper spirit and hence he could not expect any appreciable resuits. But to the farmer who feels that he is not getting all out of his farm that he should, who wishes to get himself somewhere, agriculturally speaking, to this type of man experimentation offers great opportunities.

the United States Department of Agriculture and the various state experiment stations are constantly giving many valuable pointers to farmers the country over. These agencies, however, can ay down only the general experimental facts adaptable to your territory. For instance, the Virginia Experimental Station can tell you the best districts in which to grow certain crops. It can tell you the best insecticides to use in your fight against some ravaging insect, but when it comes to telling you what crops are going to pay you best on your particular farm, the experiment station admits it does not know. If the experiment station could conduct a series of experiments on that farm of yours it could tell you, but then these experiments would be of little value to other farmers; hence, the experiment station can assist you in your experimenta wek, but it can never entirely take it over.

Now, when you hear of some wonderful new grain which promises big yields, lay off a little plat unid give it a trial. Do not he risky enough to som a forty or sixty-scre field to a crep, the adaptability of which to your particular soil has never been determined. You might win by sowing a large acreage but you are taking a gambling chance, and of all people the farmer can least affeed to take any of these gambling chances. Keep a few experimental plats going all the time; they will prove to be invaluable as guides to your farming in the

Of course, experimentation does not com itself to crops, or bresis of live stock, or any other single phase of agriculture. To messesfully carry on the pursuit of agreemback experimentation be a part of the program. This is no new gospel, h is one which connet be emphasized two strongly Paraners ary out that they do not know what their soil lacks, what it needs to make it preductive. Well, each farmer must be his own diagnostician he made estarable by experiments what his soil needs, and then he must religiously follow what he has proven to be the right course. Once you get the stride in experimentation nothing in connection with your farm life will appear more interesting, and certainly nothing will guarantee wo greater returns for years to come.

# **ECHOES FROM CONFERENCE**

Wilson and Daniels Speak Before M.E. Church Conference in Washington Last Week.

Hastington Ster.]

The need of college-trained men in the ministry as well as in other walks of life was brought out in an address by Rev. Dr. R. H. Bennett, director of the correspondence school of the Methodist Episcopal church South Friday morning at the 131st session ence, meeting in the auditorium of the Mount Vernon Place church.

Dr. Bennett's vivid appealfollowing, as it did, the keynote of the conference, struck at the opening session Wednesday, when the educational opportunity confronting the church in the buildbrought out by speakers—reinforced and brought home the argument that education is one of the great means of salvation of the church as well as of the state.

"We cannot blink the fact. seen plainly everywhere, that a college education is well nigh indispensable, except in the rare cases of those men who seem to educate themselves," declared Dr. Bennett. Applying the situation to the ministry, he said:

There are a great many people who think of a preacher as an nimated smile in a white cravet smiling at the sisters. This condition must be met."

PRESIDENT WILSON SPEAKS.

The banner event of the Baltimore conference proved to be the visit and address of President Wilson Thursday night, Mar. 25. The President said, in part:

"I have the feeling, as I look upon you, that I have had in meny other church conferences that I am looking in the faces of nin and women who are not inbut are interested in the permanent things; who give very little thought. I hope and believe to the things that separate us and give a great deal of thought to the things that unite us things that are good for the healing of: For Sale -Two runabouts, 1 this nation not only, but for the healing of all the nations.

"I value the churches of this cuntry as I would value every thing else that makes for the stability of our moral processes. There are a great many people not so many that they give me any particular concern—but, nev ertheless, a great many people who, in the language of the day, are trying hard to rock the boat." The boat is to big for them to rock. They are of such light material that they cannot rock it very much, but they are going through the motions, and it is just as well for them to look around once in a while and see the great, steadfast body of selfpossessed Americans not to be hurried into an unconsidered line of action, sure that when you are right you can be calm, sure that when the quarrel is none of yours, you can be impartial: sure that the men who spend their nod most will move the body politic the least, and that the reaction will not be upon the great body of American citizens, but upon themselves."

SECRETARY DANIELS' ADDRES Secretary Daniels of the Navy was on the platform and was called upon by Bishop Candler. for an address, following the retirement of the presidential party.

"I was been in a Methodist home," the Secretary said, "rocked in a Methodist cradle, and if there is anything in me I owe it to my Methodist mother and my Methodist training. We may adopt new methods to meet new conditions, but we must not depart from the old creeds and teachings of the good old Metho dist faith. Let us hold fast to the old faith and to the old creeds and seek inspiration at the old altars."




