## PUBLIC HEALTH **NURSE ARRIVES**

Miss Audrey Drake, of Rich mond, Will Take Charge of School Inspection.

Miss Audrey Drake, the public health nurse supplied by the Prince William Red Cross to assist in the county health campaign, arrived in Managas Tuesday. Miss Drake is a graduate of the nurses training school of Stuart Circle Hespital in Richmond and of the Richmond School of Social Service and Public Health Nursing. She has been assistant superintendent of Stuart Circle Hospital and has had practical experience in medical inspection of children in the public schools of Richmond.

Miss Drake will assist Dr. Edgar C. Harper, physician in charge, in the medical inspection of children in the Prince William county schools. She will carry home the doctors' advice to the parents of any child who is not perfectly well and will explain what the trouble is and what can be done to relieve it.

She will instruct the child with a reak hack in exercise to make him mothers to plan the proper dietary for undernourished children. She will seek to remove the causes of eyestrain and headache by securing better Mehting and ventilation. She frequent inspection of children to discover unclean hands and decayed teeth with good health, good temper and good school work, and she will endeavor to teach the children to work for good health at home and at school. 

DOES EDUCATION PAY?

That the boy who leaves school at sighteen at the age of twenty-five has an advantage over the boy who leaves school at fourteen equal to an investment of \$18,000 at five per cent, according to figures taken from a study of actual cases and submitted by the Bureau of Education, is particularly welcome news at this time. When it has been said that professors in some of our foremost colleges are almost subordinated, so far as the pay roll is concerned, to the janiters whose services are necessary to the cleanliness of the college buildings, cold, hard figures like these are much to be de-

red.
The scales of salaries affecting the unskilled and comparatively uneducated workman and the man who has received the average education possible at the age of eighteen apparently have been so nearly the same that it is hard to convince the fourteen-yearold boy of today who sees a war-time salary immediately ahead that an education will pay bigger dividends. It is not the easiest thing in the world for him to study in contentment and

wait for the dividends to be declared. While wages have increased with the war, the proportions shown in the table of weekly earning still hold true, the statement said. The boy who left school at fourteen at the time the investigation was made received an average of \$4 a week, his wages increasing each year to \$7 a week at eigh-The boy who remained in school until he was eighteen began work at \$10 a week. At twenty the malaries were \$9.50 a week for the boy who left school early and \$15 for his better trained competitor. At twentyfive they were earning \$12.75 and \$31 respectively, and total wages up to that time had been \$5,112.50 and \$7,-837.50, so that the boy who remained in school had carned nearly 50 per cent more in eight years than the other lad in twelve years.

A MOST SERIOUS CONDITION Pick up almost any county paper in Virginia and you will there note the large number of public sales being held by farmers who are retiring from farming. Investigation will prove to you that these farmers are not cessing to farm on account of harrier obtained sufficient means to justify them in retiring from business, but that they are ceasing to farm on account of the present labor conditions and the uncertainty of our government's future course towards them. They do not feel that our government has treated them fairly by sanctioning wage increases and shorter hours for union labor and then urging the farmer and farm laborer to work longer hours, at no increase for products or labor, in order to feed city labor at a lower cost and at a price for food entirely disproportionate to the cost of food production, based upon the cost of producing, and the price asked for everything else. They do not believe the government has treated them fairly in regulating the price of what they have to sell and placing no price restrictions upon what they have to buy, and fearing further government diserimination against them, many of them are simply ceasing to farm, believing they will be bankrupted by further federal legislation. This is a most serious condition and if similar conditions exist in other states the American people may seen be called upon to face a problem, far more serious than those existing in many famine stricken lands of Europa, for famine is a breeder of disease, a treater of revolution and both moun death to many.--Loudoun Times.



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

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
