

Q How long after my discharge may my insurance be renewed?

A You may be reinstated at any time within the first eighteen months by paying the premium for the month in which your insurance lapsed and for the month you are reinstated. No premiun is required for the intervening months.

Q Is a physical examination necsary to have insurance converted? A No physical examination is necessary to convert your insurance unless it has been over two months since you dropped it. 


