

Refusal to heed these warnings, the ginners are notified, will be followed by the desthe torch. In numerous histories, in several of the sands, these threats have been carried out.

It is a truism that any movement

seemded in lawlessness, however real thy be the grievances which lie back it, defeats its own purpose and in the end reacts injuriously upon the cause in whose behalf it is mistakearly conceived and prosecuted. Lawseness creates anarchy, and anarchy beings tenfold more evils upon , the community which tolerates and supnorts it than it cures. No worthy movement ever gains strength by countenancing lawlessness in any form. That will prove true in the case of the outlawry that is now reading through the south.

There may be influences operating in the cotton market which tend unduly to depress prices, but, & se, with existing laws and their own power of self-reliance, the farmers have readyforged the weapons with which to combat these influences; and in their assertion they have back of them the undefeatable law of supply and demaind. They are not lacking in counuse of these powerful weapons to re-

be pursued, for which adequate financial support will not be lacking, the market will respond with naturalness is the restoration of a stable price basis. In no other way can this objest be effectually attained to the adwintage of the cotton growers, and the seoner they unite to suppress the lawless movements in their midst, the better for them.-Richmond Times Dispatch.






