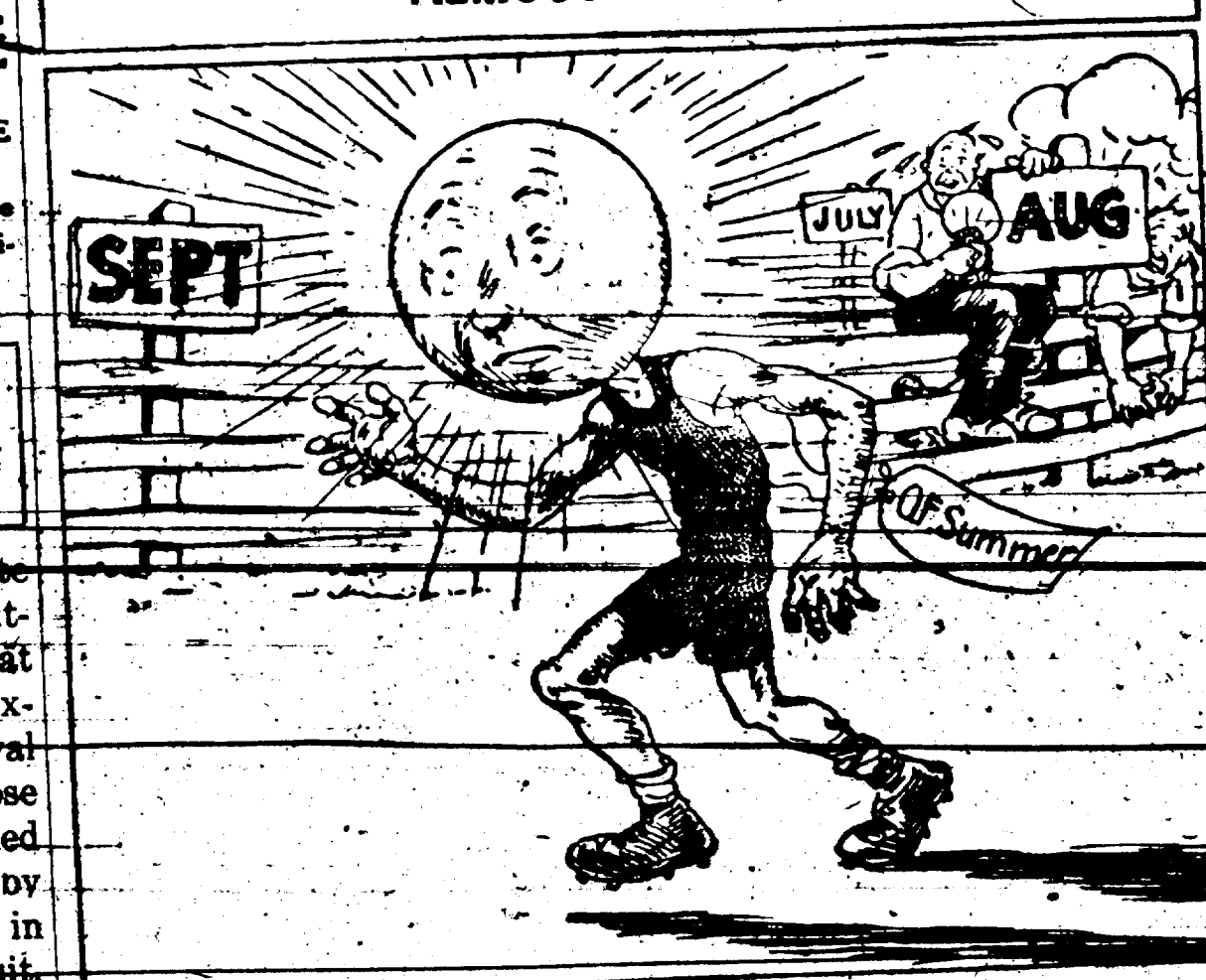

Brakeman Victim of Fatality. James E. Whitlock Steps in Front of Moving Passenger Train in Manassas Yards--Dies on Way to Hospital. James E. Whitlock was struck by a locomotive in the Manassas yards shortly after 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. He died two hours later.

"MY PROTEST PUBLIC DUTY," SAYS ROUND

Declares School Board Has Taken Control from Agricultural School Director and Established Independent Control. George C. Round declares that it was his duty to call attention to and to protest against the recent action of Manassas District School Board.

While in the act of signaling to the engineer of a freight train switching in the yards, Whitlock, a brakeman, standing on the edge of the track, was struck by the locomotive of passenger train No. 29. He had turned down the track and did not observe the approach of the fast through train, neither did he hear the warning of W. H. Clarke, who called to him from some distance away. Whitlock was hurled to the side of the track, his head striking the edge of a tie. He suffered fractures of the skull, arms and one leg. The fatality occurred near the Main hotel property.

Whitlock was barely breathing when lifted from the track and a surgeon dressed his injuries. He was placed in the caboose of his train and taken to Alexandria and died in an ambulance on the way to Alexandria Hospital. Whitlock was 22 years old, single, married, and lived at Elkwood, near Gatharpin. While employed by the Southern railroad he had resided on South Fayette street, in Alexandria. He was a member of R. B. Lodge No. 3, No. 412, Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. His brother, Robert Whitlock, a conductor, is well known in Manassas.

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QUESTIONS FROM SOME OF ACTUAL PRACTICES FOLLOWED BY SUCCESSFUL HOG RAISERS - SOME OF DIFFICULTIES ENCOUNTERED.

By (BY O. H. ALPORD)

The following questions give some of the actual practices followed by successful hog raisers and suggest some of the most serious obstacles likely to be encountered.

In speaking of raising hogs for pork, Mr. Foster of Louisiana says:

"I think two liters should be raised every winter pasture - can be done cheaply, otherwise only a spring litter to be turned off at eight or nine months. In feeding breeding sows, I simply see that they are improving in flesh and strength and have laxative food before farrowing. If pasture does not keep their bowels in good condition, I feed bran or cottonseed meal for a short time previous to farrowing. On my plantation I put up every Thursday evening at 8:00 in the morning a quart of molasses and a quart of bran on corn and alfalfa pasture, charging corn at 40 cents per bushel and pasture at 40 cents per acre. I have a large number of hogs, but I do not keep their bowels in good condition by crowding too many hogs together and disregarding sanitation. I never keep more than two or four sows having my pasture subdivided by portable fences for feeding, shelter, and a large shade of hogs do one-half to one acre each, with a cheap shelter in each lot. I never saw any of a large number of hogs do better than this. The fewer in a drove the better."
