The Danville, Ill. News has to say about the Miller Train Control, a device for the prevention of train wrecks: "Leading all other railroads in attempt to prevent loss of life and property by disastrous road wrecks, the C. & E. I. road has contracted with the Miller Train Control company, of Washington, D. C., to install its safety device on 170 miles of its line, starting at Woodland Junction and following the Villa Grove effect of the Chicago division entire length. From Villa Grove the course branches off to the Findlay division of the Ohio district and continues length of the division, ending Salem. The safety device and appliances is to be installed along single and double track for entire 170 miles and also all lines running over these divisions, about 150 in number, will be fitted with the safety appliance."

PICTURES PICKETT AS AN ENEMY OF LEE

CUT-MONEY RELATES INCIDENTS
Prof. Venable, of Lee Staff Talks of Lee Ordering General Pickett Under Arrest For the Five Forks Affair.

S. T. Hall, in cleaning out a drawer of a second-hand bureau, purchased in Washington, came across an interesting clipping from a Washington paper giving an account of the alleged unpleasant relations between General Robert E. Lee and General Pickett at the close of the great civil war concerning which so much has been said. Following is what Col. Mosby had to say in relation to the matter according to the clipping referred to:

"In an article in the April number of Munsey's Magazine, Col. John S. Mosby tells of a remarkable incident between General Robert E. Lee and General Geo. E. Pickett, occurring some years after the close of the War between the States. It makes reference to an arrest of General Pickett on General Lee's order, and shows had feeling between the two Confederate leaders. The article is entitled 'Personal Recollections of General Lee,' and is in part as follows:

"I met General Lee a few times after the war, but the days of strife were never mentioned. I remember the last words he spoke to me, about two months before his death, at a reception that was given to him in Alexandria. When I bade him good-bye, he said: 'Colonel, I hope we shall have no more wars.'"

"In March, 1870, I was walking across the bridge that connected the Ballard and Exchange Hotels in Richmond, and to my surprise I met General Lee and his daughter. The general was pale and haggard, and did not look like the Apollo I had known in the army. After a while I went to his rooms, and he came to the door. He looked at me and said: 'What do you want?' I felt oppressed by the great memories that his presence revived, and while both of us were thinking about the war, neither of us referred to it.

"After leaving his room I met General Pickett, and told him that I had just been with Lee. He remarked that if I would go with him he would call and pay his respects to the general, but he did not want to be alone with him. So I went back with Pickett; the interview was cold and formal, and evidently embarrassing to both commanders. It was their only meeting after the war. In a few minutes I arose and left the room together with General Pickett. He then spoke to me very bitterly of General Lee, saying: 'That old man...'

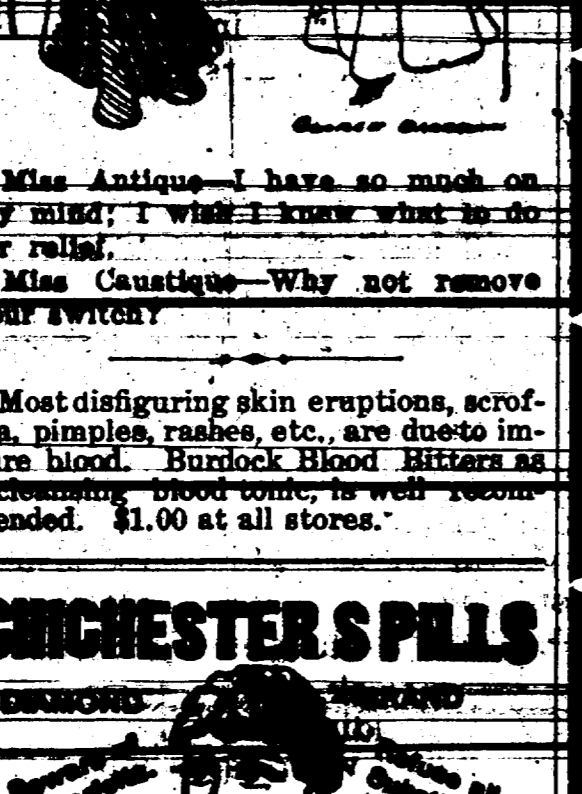
"He had my division massacred at Gettysburg," Pickett said. "Well, it makes you immortal," I replied.

"Further suppose that Pickett gave a wrong reason for his unfriendly feelings. In May, 1892, at the University of Virginia, I took breakfast with Professor Venable, who had been on Lee's staff. He told me that some days before the surrender at Appomattox General Lee ordered General Pickett under arrest. I suppose for the Five Forks Affair, I think the professor said he carried the order. I remember very well his saying that on the morning of the surrender he passed them, and that General Lee said, with deep feeling: 'Is that man still with this army?'"

RAPLACE BROKEN RIBS WITH THOSE OF GOLD

EVERY BONE IN BODY FRACTURED
Theodore Peters, Sunday afternoon, was walking the streets of Washington with every bone in his body, even those in his neck patched and spliced together with gold, steel and other metals, and appeared to be in much better health than many of the pedestrians he passed on the thoroughfares of the National capital.

Five years ago Teddy Peters fell three hundred and fifty feet into the St. Lawrence River in an effort to save a companion. Both legs, both arms, his neck, all his ribs, and in fact, every bone in his body of any size was fractured, many of them so badly that they had to be substituted with artificial ones.

For a year and a half he was in a hospital, and because of the extreme interest attached to his case the most skilled surgical art-teries possible were given him. RECOVERED HIS SANITY For one year he was insane, but finally the physicians through persistent efforts, restored his reason and during the past six months he waged a determined fight through his own will power, for his life. Peters has a gold plate in the top of his skull larger than a silver dollar, and undoubtedly has the most valuable set of ribs in existence, for they are all of solid gold.

His neck is held up by a stiff steel brace, and he says doctors are now working on an electrical appliance that will aid him materially in turning his head. His elbows have metal joints and while he can only turn in certain directions he appears to have very little inconvenience in using them. Large sections of bones in his legs have been replaced by metal, but he walks as fast and apparently with as much ease and comfort as the average pedestrian.

Peters was born at Locust Point near Baltimore, forty-four years ago, and prior to the accident he was a structural iron worker. Teddy's coat is adorned with all sorts of medals. One is a silver medal which was presented to him for having cut a cable in Manila bay during the Spanish-American war. Another is that he terms his Seattle medal which he says was given him for saving the life of an entombed miner. This rescue, says he, was his greatest accident and while he is a member of the Red Men, I. O. O. F., Foresters of America, and A. F. and A. M. Peters says he will visit the States in Washington and vicinity until September 1, and in the meantime will visit the battle-grounds of Bull Run. He will then go to Europe and show the people across the great pond the power of endurance American men are capable of and of the skill of American surgeons.

Care of Ducklings
Ducklings require special attention for two or three weeks, to insure their proper growth and health. They can be raised on a diet of corn and chick feed, but are hardly ever troubled with lice and mites. With a mash feed morning and night, and grass range, they practically take care of themselves.

POULTRY NOTES
Keep your chicks on dry ground. Ohio makes an excellent ration for laying hens. Nothing fattens young turkeys like corn. Don't overfeed the brooder, brood, geese or colony coops. The young turkeys will not begin to fatten until cold weather sets in. Never use a hot water bottle in a nest. It is best to kill lice on the table, before preparing them for the table. Poor quality poultry may be kept in the house, but they will not lay. Clip the main feathers on one wing of the fowling fowl. That will keep her in. How to spread up chicken runs, if any well covered, and now sets or try. Move chicks outside to new ground before the grass in the old run is worn. Don't put to empty abundant straw and shavings in their runs and brooding chicks. The smoother the roosting poles the more easily they can be kept free from vermin. The stock will benefit from your intelligent use of a good lice and mite killing preparation during the heated season. Do not let your young birds roost with the old hens, as they are liable to catch diseases which old hens are more subject to. Always keep their second laying season should be disposed of at once to make room for the young stock.

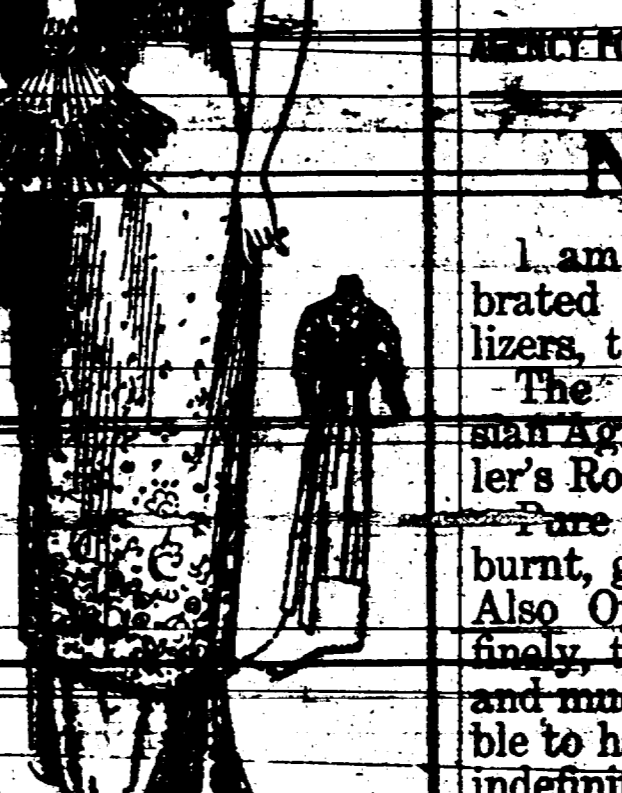

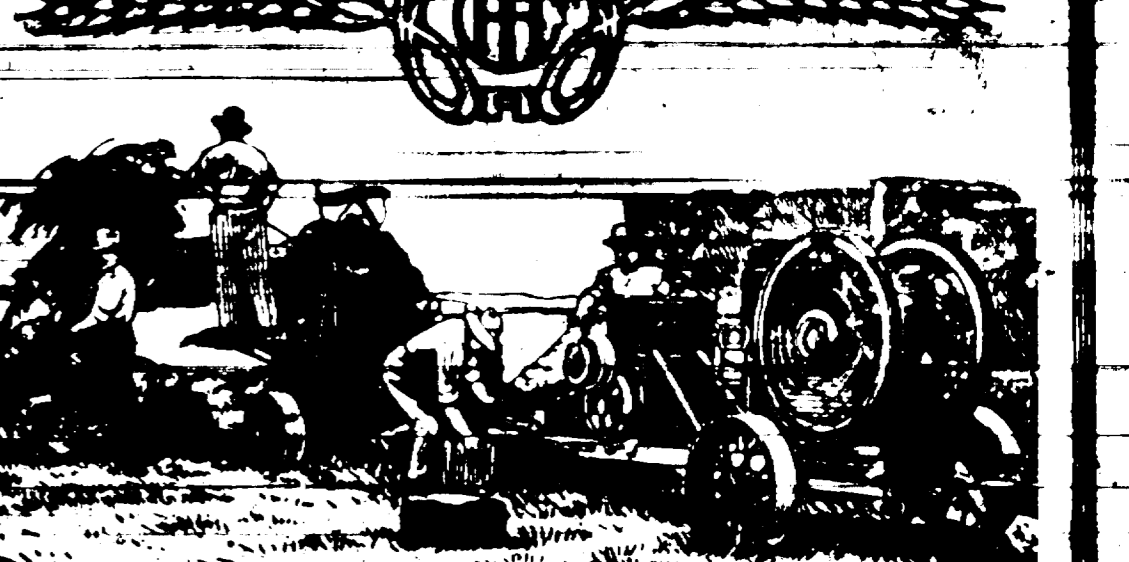
