





**THE PARCELS POST AND GOOD ROADS**

**BUILD AND MAINTAIN GOOD ROADS**

Parcel Post Has Increased Importance of Rural Delivery and Rural Delivery Requires Good Roads.

The parcels post system makes good roads imperative. No argument will be more convincing to the farmer living on a poor road than to learn that one living on a rural free delivery route can get packages delivered at his door by parcel post, when he himself must go to the nearest post office and take them home himself. The argument will be more convincing when the rural delivery carrier is provided with scales to facilitate the sending of packages by his patrons from their own houses. The result will be more demand for rural delivery routes; more attention to road making and maintenance.

Congress has made provision for a joint committee "to make inquiry into the subject of federal aid in the construction of post roads and report at the earliest practicable date," and has appropriated half a million dollars for experimenting in the improvement of roads throughout the country. As every road traversed by a rural delivery carrier is a post road, it would seem within the province of Congress to appropriate money for its improvement under article 1, section 8, of the Constitution of the United States, which gives it "power to establish postoffices and post-roads." The secretary of agriculture, in cooperation with the postmaster general, is to expend the money in improving the condition of roads to be selected by them, over which rural delivery is or may hereafter be established. The object is to ascertain: (1) The increase in the territory which could be served by each carrier as a result of such improvement; (2) The possible increase in the number of delivery days in each year; (3) The amount required in excess of local expenditures for the proper maintenance of such roads; (4) The relative saving to the government in the operation of the rural delivery service and to the local inhabitants in the transportation of their products by reason of such improvement.

If the plans suggested are followed, about \$1,000 will be the share of each state, but the state or local subdivision in which the improvement so provided is made must furnish to the same end double the amount which the federal government is to supply. This money is to be expended mostly in repairing and improving existing roads under the direction of road experts.

Parcel post has increased the importance of rural delivery, and rural delivery requires good roads. Not merely roads which once were in good condition for travel, but such as are maintained in the best possible order suitable for heavier vehicles than the rural delivery carrier has heretofore used. The postoffice department will not now, and should not maintain delivery routes over country roads or city streets which the local authorities allow to fall into a bad state of repair.

The Times-Union has for years preached the doctrine not only of good road construction, but also related and equally important one of road maintenance. A road begins to deteriorate from the day it is opened to travel, and there are counties in almost every state in the country, except possibly Massachusetts and Colorado, in which a road now as bad as, or worse than, they were before they were improved. Every dollar invested in road improvement, or building, is a sheer waste of money if the roads are not kept in constant repair. This means constant supervision to see that breaks are repaired and ruts filled up as soon as they appear, and while the

cost of repair is still likely to be small. The money which should have been used in filling such holes and ruts, in keeping the surface smooth and hard, becomes, if withheld, a debt owed to the road which compounds at a heavy rate of interest. No money should be spent in surfacing a road unless provision is to be made for the expenditure of money in keeping that surface in prime condition.

With the federal government, under the stimulus of the needs of the parcels post service, taking part in the building and maintenance of roads we may expect to see good roads remain good, bad ones made into good roads.

To expend public money in the construction of a road and afterward allow that road to fall into disrepair is a sort of misfeasance on the part of the officials or board charged with the supervision of the public highways, and the United States government does not do things that way.—Florida Times-Union.

**LITTLE FALLS FARM SOLD**

Messrs. Wm. W. Butzner, F. H. Chester and C. O'Connor Goodick, receivers of the Little Falls Farm in Stafford county, about three miles from this city, sold the farm at public auction in front of the Law Building here Saturday. Mr. Corbin Thompson of Occoquan, was the purchaser at \$25,000. The sale is subject to confirmation by the court. The farm is one of the best in this section, and contains many good outbuildings. There are 880 acres in the tract.

Mr. Thompson, who is a large dairy farm owner and operator, will use Little Falls Farm for stock. He will graze a number of young cattle on the place the coming season, should the sale be confirmed.—Free Lance.

**THE INCOME TAX**

By the ratification of the Sixteenth Amendment to the Federal Constitution Congress is now authorized to levy a direct tax on incomes whether derived from invested capital or business. This is the first amendment to the Federal Constitution since the Fifteenth, adopted March 30, 1870. If sugar is put on the free list, as it should be, and the tariff tax is reduced on the necessities of life, as the Democrats have proclaimed they will do, then this income tax becomes necessary in order to meet the imperative demands of the Federal Government, to pay its running expenses, to meet the enormous expenditures that are piling up higher and higher every year. The taxes now paid by our people are about as much as they can bear. It is stated that Federal income tax will not hurt many people, for they will not have the income which the Federal Government will tax. The multi-millionaires and the rich corporations will have to pay it. So we will not commit suicide just now to escape the Federal income tax. Most of us would be only too glad to have the income and would cheerfully pay the tax if we had such an income as will be taxed.—Free Lance.

**EXCHANGE LETTER**

With the favorable action of the legislatures of Wyoming and Delaware, the income tax amendment is now a part of the Federal Constitution. Not since 1870, when the famous civil rights bill became a fundamental law, has the Constitution been amended in this way. The new amendment provides: XVI. The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States and without regard to any census or enumeration.

The democrats are greatly pleased over the final ratification of this amendment, and are already at work on a bill providing for an income tax. Representative

of the House of Representatives, Heike, of Tennessee, who has been the champion of the measure, is now in the city.

Statistics show that in 26 counties negroes raised for their schools \$18,388. As a means of stimulating more interest President Long has secured \$100,000 which will be given away in prizes at the Norfolk meeting.

The Co-operative Education Association is lending assistance to the colored association. Last year at the meeting in Lynchburg, J. H. Binford, secretary, addressed the teachers and this year Mrs. B. E. Mumford will address them. Jackson Davis, supervisor of the rural elementary schools, is rendering valuable service in helping the colored teachers.

**NEEDS TEACHERS**

The State Association of Negro Teachers will meet in Norfolk on Feb. 27 and 28. The organization is composed largely of negro teachers in the public and private schools in Virginia. Including those in private schools there are over 3,800 teachers eligible to membership. It has been predicted that one-third of this number will be in attendance at Norfolk. The Department of Public Instruction is giving its endorsement to the efforts of the colored people to build up an educational organization.

State Superintendent Stearns has sent requests for superintendents of the division to allow their colored teachers to be exempted to go to the Norfolk meeting.

Although it is supposed that the justices of the Supreme Court have reached a conclusion in the famous rate cases before that court, yet no decision has been handed down. Financial and railway interests are much disappointed by the delay in this all-important matter.

The wives of Senators and Congressmen have an organization called the Congressional Club. There is high tension over the election of its officers. Mrs. Claude A. Swanson, wife of the Senator from Virginia, and Mrs. Duncan U. Fletcher, wife of Senator Fletcher from

**Florida, are active candidates for the office of president, and the result is being watched with much interest, especially as women are taking such active part now in public affairs.**

The only other amendment now pending is that for the direct election of United States senators, submitted to the state legislatures last summer; but the advocates of several more are active in Congress. In the Senate there was vigorous discussion of the proposal to limit the President to a single term of six years; and the close vote of 81 to 66 against the proposal to direct the President by direct primary, and to elect him by popular vote, is significant of the widespread and deep-seated demand of the people for closer participation in the affairs of the government.

The Supreme Court has affirmed the conviction of Charles R. Heike, former secretary of one of the companies forging the sugar trust.

This means that Heike, a salaried employee, must serve a prison term while the men higher up, who were really responsible for the frauds and who profited by them, may never be disturbed by the law they have outraged.

GEORGE D. BAKER, FUNERAL DIRECTOR
Only a little more than a month remains in which physicians of Virginia may file their certificate of license with the clerk of courts, as required by act of the Legislature passed last winter. Every practicing physician in the State must attend to this duty by March 13, or within one year of the day the governor signed the new law. It is explained that no hardship whatever is worked to any one who is entitled to be qualified, and that the proceeding will be away with quicks and illegal practitioners in Virginia. Practitioners duly registered may sue in the courts of the Commonwealth for recovery of charges for medical or surgical attendance and advice; they may render valid medical, death and birth certificates; they may assume the title of doctor, and may be exempt from serving on juries and in a militia.

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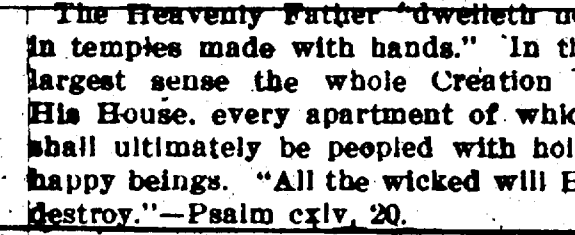
