DEPARTMENT FARM IMPROVEMENT WORK

GREAT BENEFIT TO OUR FARMERS

Methods Advocated by Southern's Field Agents Bring Good Results Throughout the South.

An average yield of 46.6 bushels of corn per acre was secured by 496 farmers in Alabama and Mississippi who cultivated 6,352.5 acres in 1912, following the methods advocated by the field agents of the Department of Farm Improvement Work, maintained by the companies that make up the Southern Railway system. On neighboring farms where the ordinary methods were followed the average yield was 17.5 bushels per acre. In the same states 674 farmers who grew cotton under the methods advocated by this department had an average production of 1,205.5 pounds of seed cotton per acre on 14,389 acres while on neighboring farms where ordinary methods were followed the average yield was 531.5 pounds of seed cotton per acre. C. A. Lawrence, of Plantersville, Ala., averaged 109.25 bushels of corn per acre on 85 acres; A. Henderson, of Greenwood, Miss., averaged 100 bushels per acre on 25 acres; B. Kilian, of Collinsville, Ala., averaged 2,782 pounds of seed cotton per acre on 6 acres; Dr. C. N. Parnell, of Maplesville, Ala., averaged 2,819 pounds on 20 acres, and a long list of other farmers who made splendid yields of both corn and cotton by following the methods advocated by the department could be given.

These figures from the annual report of Mr. T. O. Plunkett, manager of the department, show what is being accomplished by farmers living along the lines of the Southern railway and affiliated companies through the aid of the agricultural experts, the farmers in all cases cultivating their own land with the assistance at their command. The work of this department has been extended to all states served by the Southern railway and affiliated lines, field agents having been placed in Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Kentucky and Tennessee in September, 1912. They have been cordially received and it is expected that their work will prove as successful as that of the agents in Alabama and Mississippi.

The Department of Farm Improvement Work grew out of the movement inaugurated by President Finley to aid the farmers in territory threatened by the Mexican boll weevil to learn how to grow cotton in spite of the weevil. For this purpose practical farmers who have grown cotton in Texas under boll weevil conditions were employed and their work proved so successful in not only aiding farmers to successfully combat the weevil but also in teaching them how to get larger yields by the adoption of proper methods of culture, rotation of crops, and greater attention to live-stock raising. That President Finley determined to extend the benefits of this work to the entire territory served by the Southern Railway is a credit to his foresight. The field agents in the service of the department are agricultural experts whose services are given without any cost to the farmers and who work in full cooperation with the state and federal departments of agriculture and the various state agricultural colleges.

MAJN APPOINTS DELEGATES

Governor Maun has appointed six delegates to represent Virginia at the National Child Labor Conference next month at Jacksonville, Fla. They are Howard T. Colvin, Alexandria; Dr. D. S. Freeman and J. B. Gindinst, Richmond; Dr. Harry Heck, University of Virginia; Rev. J. E. Hicks, Danville, and Mrs. John H. Lewis, Lynchburg.

The subject of the conference is to be Child Labor and Poverty, and the Virginia law, whereby persons are deemed vagrants who, though able to work, live in idleness upon earnings of minor children, will doubtless come up for discussion.

The National Child Labor Committee working with the Virginia Child Labor Committee was largely responsible for the passing of the present Virginia Child Labor law and took an active part in securing the revision of the 10-hour law, two years ago. The Committee hopes that the next legislature will take another forward step and bring Virginia up to the standard of the Uniform Child Labor Law.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Speaker Clark is impatient with the indifference to business now manifested by members of the House. When less than a dozen men hear the chaplain's prayer and respond to the call to order, neglect has about reached the limit. "This is not the chief business of the House," he said in a session on that side. All the Taft nominations are held up, the obstructionists claim that as the people declared for new men and new policies, last November, nearly everything should be postponed until the new administration comes in.

Senator Thomas, progressive democrat from Colorado, is the one to be elected by the popular vote of both men and women, and promises to become one of the leaders. He has, already, twice broken the tradition against senators not taking part in debate until after several years of service.

All the big appropriation bills yet to be considered, and it is feared that some will fail of enactment, and if the new Congress in its special session fails to pass them promptly, we may have a repetition of the spectacle of last summer when, for six weeks there were no appropriations for the regular current expenses of the government.

It comes from good authority that the proposed amendment to the Constitution, which recently passed the approval of the Senate, authorizing a six year term for the president, and restricting him to one term, will not be further considered by the present Congress. This is due to the opposition of friends of Wilson, Taft and Roosevelt, who fear that the amendment might affect their eligibility for reelection. THE PARCEL POST

At last the parcel post! What Europe has enjoyed for years has finally become a reality here. As might be expected, the inauguration of the service was characterized by the mailing of various articles of merchandise which were more or less frankly being sent either in a spirit of fun or for advertising purposes. For instance, the ton or more of bricks which a manufacturer of clay products sent out attracted general attention because the comparison of a letter or postal card with a brick as mail matter appeared ridiculous and suggested the difficulties of the clerks and letter carriers struggling with such heavy articles. But as a matter of fact, a year hence the same man can mail a carload and little attention will result. It is the new and unusual thing that is strange, like the first bicycles that aroused derision and were a frequent mark for stones thrown by the small boy.

The service has thus far been satisfactory to the public, and the indications are that the Department, which was somewhat unprepared, will be able to expand its facilities to keep pace with what will be a steadily growing traffic. The competitive test of articles mailed and expressed from the same place to the same destination were rather in favor of the parcel post, which in some cases was a full 24 hours ahead of the express companies. The latter, however, will not go out of business, although they will have to modify rates on small packages and pay smaller dividends on watered stock; but while any innovation is discouraging for a time to the public and industry immediately affected, other occupations and forms of service soon arise to take their place. LEVY FAILED TO APPEAR

Last Thursday was the appointed day for the trial of Malcolm J. Levy in Stanton. The trial was held, although Levy failed to appear and a fine of \$500 was imposed upon the absent man. This is the maximum fine for illicit cohabitation in this State. On the charge of check cashing decision was for the time reserved. On Friday additional evidence turned up in the way of a letter written to Pawabrook by Levy, in which there was evidence of an agreement concerning the check which Levy had given Burman, supposedly for an engagement ring. This evidence was in favor of Levy and he was cleared not guilty of the charge of "larceny."

On the fine of \$500, Levy's attorney noted an appeal. Neither Levy nor his bride have been heard from since the trial, and it is said that he cannot be brought in from another state on the charge for which he was fined.—Strasburg News.
