GET READY TO FIGHT THE DEADLY HOUSE FLY Thousands and thousands of people are getting ready to fight the little housefly, the disseminator of disease and death all over the country. Flies breed in filth and carry the germ of typhoid fever, consumption and other diseases on their feet. The flies come by the million it seems and when there is no apparent cause some people think. But there is a cause for their coming. They breed in manure and other garbage about the barn and house. In about ten days they pass from the egg to the larva stage, and from the larva to the pupa and from the pupa to an adult fly, and one female fly will lay several hundred thousand eggs. Begin early by clearing out all filth and lessen manure about the barn and make every thing as sanitary as possible.

Health is worth more than any other one thing to our people and our good health depends largely on our keeping the dreadful little housefly away from us.

EVERY FARMER SHOULD HAVE A BANK ACCOUNT

The writer was in one of the banks of a small town of Virginia not long since when a farmer came in with four or five checks amounting in all to something over \$50. The cashier asked him if he did not want to deposit this and check it out as he needed it or let it draw him 3 per cent interest. He refused to do this and carried his money away with him. There may have been an immediate need for that money, but there are many of the farmers who as yet do not have any bank account. It will give a number of advantages to do business with the bank. By paying with checks you have a receipt for each bill paid in the check. It also elevates the farmer to more accurate business methods.

MEETING OF AUTOMOBILISTS

A meeting of automobile owners was held in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce at 8 o'clock Friday night for the purpose of taking steps toward bringing about a reciprocity between the authorities of the District of Columbia and the state of Virginia in regard to requirements of owners of autos who operate the same in the Old Dominion and the District of Columbia.

Ninety-seven persons residing in Alexandria and on her suburbs are owners of automobiles, and they represent about one hundred and twenty-five machines. As has been stated in the Gazette, Governor Mann is being petitioned through several sources to grant reciprocity in the matter of automobiles license between the state of Virginia and the District of Columbia. A petition to this effect is now before the Governor from Thos. Lion, commonwealth's attorney for Prince William county, and also another from Vernon Ford, of Fairfax county. These officers urge the governor to establish reciprocal relations between Virginia and the District of Columbia in the issuance of automobile licenses, as many citizens living in Washington county homes on this side of the Potomac in Virginia, and desire to motor to and from their offices.

It has been pointed out at the office of secretary of the commonwealth in Richmond that certain legal difficulties present themselves in the matter proposed. It is also shown that a wide discrepancy exists in the license tax. In the District of Columbia an automobile tax costs only \$2 and is perpetual, while in Virginia exists an annual tax ranging from \$5 to \$20.—Alexandria Gazette.
