

STATES' RIGHTS

Although the Federal Government has seemed to be taking more and more authority away from the states, the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court in the celebrated Minnesota Railroad Rate case has given a clearer outline of what rights states have to regulate their affairs than has ever been handed down before.

Some eight years ago the legislature of Minnesota passed a two-cent passenger fare law. It went into effect but the railroads brought suit in the U. S. District court on the grounds that such a rate was confiscatory and the Minnesota courts upheld them.

This looks like another step in the right direction both as to the rights of a state to control industries wholly within its borders and as to controlling the great public utilities engaged in intrastate traffic.

Five states besides Minnesota have similar cases before the Supreme Court and this practically settles them all.

All land sown to grass should be well prepared, we believe, as should the land to be planted to anything. The soil should be given time to settle down, and the capillary attraction should be reestablished between the top soil and subsoil.

THE SOUTH BECOMING A LIVE-STOCK SECTION

With the need of more live-stock we need more grass to support it. Sumner Grass Seedling Becomes Popular.

The South is becoming more of a live stock section every year and together with the need of more live stock we need more grass to support this live stock. Really, we need the grass even before we get the stock, and for this reason we should begin getting as much grass as possible.

Land to be sown to grass during August and September should be plowed early, preferably during July. If lime is to be used, it should be applied soon after the plowing is done and immediately followed with a harrow to mix the lime with the soil.

The best grass has been grown on land that has been well tilled, and this is a pretty good assurance that liming will pay on grass. We would recommend at least 1,000 pounds per acre, applied at least three weeks before the seeding is to be done.

VETS NOT PAUPERS; GUESTS OF HONOR

MISINTERPRET WORD "INDIGENT"

Westwood Hutchison Expresses Appreciation of Appropriation by County Board for Gettysburg Trip.

RAADFORD, VA., JUNE 5, 1913.

TO MY COMRADES OF THE PAST: To you comrades who wore the gray of the Confederacy I dedicate this letter, not in malice nor hate for the men who would brand you and I as paupers, but in protest that Confederate soldiers should have such an odium put upon them by their own people.

The Legislature of Virginia at its last session, by an act authorizing the supervisors of the counties of Virginia and municipal authorities to make a levy to pay the expenses of all Confederate soldiers who honorably wore the gray to the reunion of the blue and gray to be held at Gettysburg July 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th, 1913, and I hold this act made us the invited guests of Virginia, and I can not believe the Legislature of Virginia intended by their act that we were to be classified by the state as pauper-guests, but intended that we should be her guests of honor in the visit to the battlefield of Gettysburg; we were not successful it is true, but the Virginia troops as did other troops of the South write the valor and loyalty of the Confederate soldier to his cause upon the scroll of fame that can not fade.

After fifty years the man who wore the blue and the man who wore the gray, were to meet in fraternal respect on this historic field and forever bury all the past, and live in the present and futurity only. Our mother, the state of Virginia invited us to be her guests, the Legislature passed an act to pay the bill of transportation of the honorable Virginia soldiers to the reunion.

In the Legislative act the word "Indigent Soldier" is used, and some of the boards of supervisors of Virginia, have defined this word to mean paupers.

Some of the county supervisors went on and made the levy in the spirit the Legislature meant the word indigent to be used, without quibbling. All praise and honor to these men. But several county boards and some Municipal Authorities chose to interpret in their great wisdom, the word to mean pauper, and all honorable soldiers of Virginia who accepted the invitation of Virginia as her guests to visit Gettysburg Battlefield Reunion must be classified as paupers.

No Confederate soldier who honorably wore the gray could accept the state's invitation to be her guest, if he must be classified as a pauper by those wonderfully wise Spolenoms who are supervisors of counties in Virginia, who seem to know more than all Virginia's Legislators whose intent was in passing the Act, to honor and not insult the men who 50 years ago gave their all in defense of Virginia's honor. The sensible and intelligent supervisors defined the word "indigent" as the Legislature meant they should, i. e., "that all honorable Confederate soldiers of Virginia who wore the blue to take from their scanty fund, his car fare to Gettysburg and return, and in doing so, becoming the guest of the State was not a pauper guest.

Those supervisors who defined the word "indigent" to mean pauper, do not seem to discern the insult they offer us, who defended Virginia's honor, when she needed us, and it may be that some of these wise supervisors, who would now strain at a "gnat," would in the past swallowed a "camel," these men may be the progeny of the men, when Virginia needed all her sons, where hiding in the bushes to avoid service or were outright deserters, for I can not believe other than this class could

offer insult to the Confederate soldier by classing him as a pauper. We were not paupers in 1861. Comrades we are not paupers now. And this insult offered to the honorable, true Confederate soldier by these wise supervisors should not be allowed to pass by us without protest from every true soldier in the state of Virginia, who honorably wore the gray.

But we can be thankful we had in the office of Attorney General of Virginia a man, who himself but a boy soldier of the 60's, came to our defense and in his official capacity, says, we are not paupers, and took-out-of-the-ruling of those wise supervisors who would insult us, their sting and places us as guests of Virginia and not her pauper guests. I quote his letter in full.

HON. ALDEN BELL,
Culpeper, Virginia,
My Dear Sir:—

Replying to your letter of April 30th I am of opinion that the Act of the Legislature to which you refer, which authorizes the boards of supervisors of the several counties in the state to appropriate money to defray the expenses of certain indigent Confederate Veterans to the Gettysburg Celebration should be liberally construed, in order to carry out the evident intent of the Legislature, and that the word should under no circumstances be construed as to mean paupers. On the contrary the law should be so construed as to include all Confederate Veterans who are in such financial condition as to make it a hardship on them to pay the expenses of the trip, and I think that the Boards of Supervisors should give the Act this liberal construction.

The word "indigent" in this law should be construed to mean poor as it was construed by the Court of Appeals of Virginia in the case of City of Lynchburg vs. Slaughter, 76 Va. 757.

And this letter makes it possible for all honorable soldiers of Virginia who wore the gray, to attend the Reunion without the least tinge of shame.

In closing I want to call to the attention of my dear old comrades of 1861-65, how essential it is for us to have a soldier in the position who always has and always will defend the men who were honorable soldiers. Comrade Williams deserves your thanks and my thanks, which he has, for defending us from the insult, and removing the odium that would classify us as paupers.

GOLD CUPS FOR HORSE-BREEDERS

The Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture is informed by Mr. J. Sloughgrove, secretary of the Shire-Horse Society of England that the council of his society desiring to encourage the owners and breeders of Shire horses in America, have resolved to offer an gold challenge cups, valued at \$250 each, from the year 1913 to 1917, inclusive.

Two of these gold cups will be annually awarded to representative American shows in rotation during the five years that the scheme is in operation.

The council have selected the International Live Stock exhibition at Chicago for their offer in 1913, and the gold cups will be awarded (a) for the best registered Shire stallion; (b) for the best registered Shire mare, duly certified by the official veterinary office as sound and free from hereditary disease.

Horses entered for these cups must be registered or eligible for registration in the American Shire studbook.

Breeders of English Shire horses in the United States will no doubt be interested and encouraged by this recognition of Shire breeding in the United States by the parent society.

TO STAY THE BEEF FAMINE

One of the striking resolutions adopted by the National Retail Grocers' Association at its convention in St. Louis favored a national law "prohibiting the slaughter of baby live stock for a period of years so as to replenish the supply of beef."

This resolution is the attempt to rectify a situation which Uncle Sam might contemplate with the extreme gravity. There are fewer cattle by many thousands than there were in this country ten years ago and there are many more consumers of beef. Statistics published not long ago show that there were fifty or a hundred cattle were shipped abroad a few years since only one head goes now. The cattle ranches have disappeared and farmsteads have risen upon the ranges over which the cattle fed. But these farms, in their aggregate, do not care for as much live stock as the old ranches. Moreover there has been a constantly increasing temptation for farmers in other sections of the country to part with their stock, to let their breeding animals go and to meet the market demands for the younger and tender meat—the temptation of high prices.

An actual prohibition against the slaughter of calves might save the tendency toward a still worse beef famine than now exists. It is certainly worth considering most seriously.
