

Robert J. Walker, of Osceola Mills., is the only survivor of the Signal detachment which operated six lively signal lines from the top of Kenesaw mountain, October 3-10, 1864. He was acting sergeant of the signal squad of Lieut. Fish, who was in command. Walker copied and handed to Gen. Sherman the famous "cheekbone" message from Corse soon after the victory at Altoona, 18 miles away. Sherman had been at his side all day, very nervous and excitable, as he watched the valley below him, the movements of the 23rd corps marching to the relief of the pass, and heard the distant cannonade and saw the smoke of battle. When he handed Sherman the message, the general jumped to his feet, burst into a laugh and said; "I knew Corse would hold the fort. There were also present in the Chattanooga meeting of Signal Veterans two members of Lieut. Adams signalmen, who were at the Altoona fight and who helped flag the messages to Sherman. They are L. H. Fulton, of Salem, O., and B. F. Bretz, of Clyde, O. The signalmen were armed with revolvers, but they soon got a chance to take up the guns of their fallen comrades and aided the infantry in the defense.
