In the spring, when the most popular literature is the great catalogues, it gives pleasure to sit down and figure out how, in your 20 by 30 garden, you can raise remarkable crops. You plan on so many rows of beans, so many hills of "cukes" and so much of this and that. You dope it out that you will knock the high cost of living higher than the price of gasoline. But before fall you realize that there is no garden produce worth mention—your figures apparently were fallacious.

Few go through life without at some time keeping chickens. The desire to run out to the nest and get a few fresh-laid eggs is very natural. There is fun in this sort of business. You become an enthusiast. With a comfortable chair before the henhouse, you take pen and pencil and proceed to make your fortune in poultry. Let's see now, so many dozen eggs at 65—no, 75—cents a dozen. Cost of feed so much—only a trifle. Isn't it an easy way to make one's living? Yes, sir, there's money in poultry. There would be, too, if the blamed hens would only lay.

Figures, they say, do not lie. When one observes the present styles of dress, he is inclined literally to believe the statement. Figures themselves are the most logical things of which we know. When we add two and two and get four, the result is incontrovertible. Nothing under the heavens could make two and two equal three. So it is when we sit down and figure out how to make money. Our figures are all right. There are no errors in our computations. Things simply don't turn out as planned.

It is sometimes good sport, however, counting these chickens that never hatch. It keeps the mind from stagnation. Still it is most profitable when the figuring doesn't involve an investment of money.

Common Rat Is a Menace to Public

PELLAGRA SPREAD ALARMING DOCTORS

The United States is menaced today by a rapidly spreading disease that in many respects is even worse than leprosy. Warning against the dread advance of pellagra is sounded by the Public Health Service, and so alarming are the reports in the hands of Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo by Surgeon-General Blue, Congress will be urged to furnish appropriations to fight this menace.

Pellagra has spread from a few cases in the South in 1907 to forty-four states and a grand total of approximately 50,000 cases for the six years. The disease, however, is largely confined to the southeastern territory, lying south of the Ohio and Potomac rivers, and generally east of the Mississippi, excepting Texas and Arkansas. It made its appearance in the District of Columbia nearly two years ago.

The disease is known throughout southern Europe as "mal de St. Viti" and has been known since 1735, scientists and physicians have no exact knowledge to use in a fight against it. Many of its symptoms resemble those of leprosy, excepting that in many instances it attacks the mind and will, driving the victim quickly to leaving insanity.

Whether it is contagious and how it is carried are mysteries, and there is no positive cure. Secretary McAdoo will ask Congress for funds to establish a hospital and investigation laboratories in the Southern States. Some time ago it was declared the disease was associated with the eating of corn meal or other dried corn products, but this theory has failed of proof and physicians are not ready to accept it.

RESTORE BLOOD AFTER CLEANING

An apparatus by which blood may be removed, cleansed and returned to the system, and a contrivance by which it can be determined whether one is suffering from hunger or merely has an appetite, were inventions demonstrated today by members of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology. In annual session here. A dog was utilized to illustrate the blood purifying apparatus invented by Doctors J. J. Abel, L. G. Bourne and B. B. Turner, of Johns Hopkins University. Dr. A. J. Carlson, of the University of Chicago, demonstrated on himself the efficiency of the hunger-testing machine, his own invention.

LET THERE BE LIGHT

The public school system of Virginia went into operation in 1871. Since then the State has expended more than sixty millions of dollars on its maintenance and development. Now Superintendent Stearnes is pleading for a heavy increase of the annual appropriation in the Department of Education says there are eighty-one thousand white children in the State, over ten years of age, whose illiteracy is such that they cannot write their names.

Dr. Carlson divined hunger as sensation arising in the stomach, while appetite, he explained, is a nervous phenomena of the brain. Swallowing a little cigar-shaped rubber ball, which had been inflated with long rubber tubes, he inflated the balloon in his stomach through the tubes and then attached the latter to sensitized paper.

Hunger, he declared, caused the muscles of the stomach to grip the balloon and drive out the air. This registered the amount of hunger on the sensitized paper. White rats and mice were used in an experiment to illustrate the diffusion of the blood supply. Jaws injected into their blood vessels circulated in a short time until the little animals changed the color of their head without much apparent discomfort. One rat was green to the end of his tail, while even the tip of his tail was the color of an emerald.
