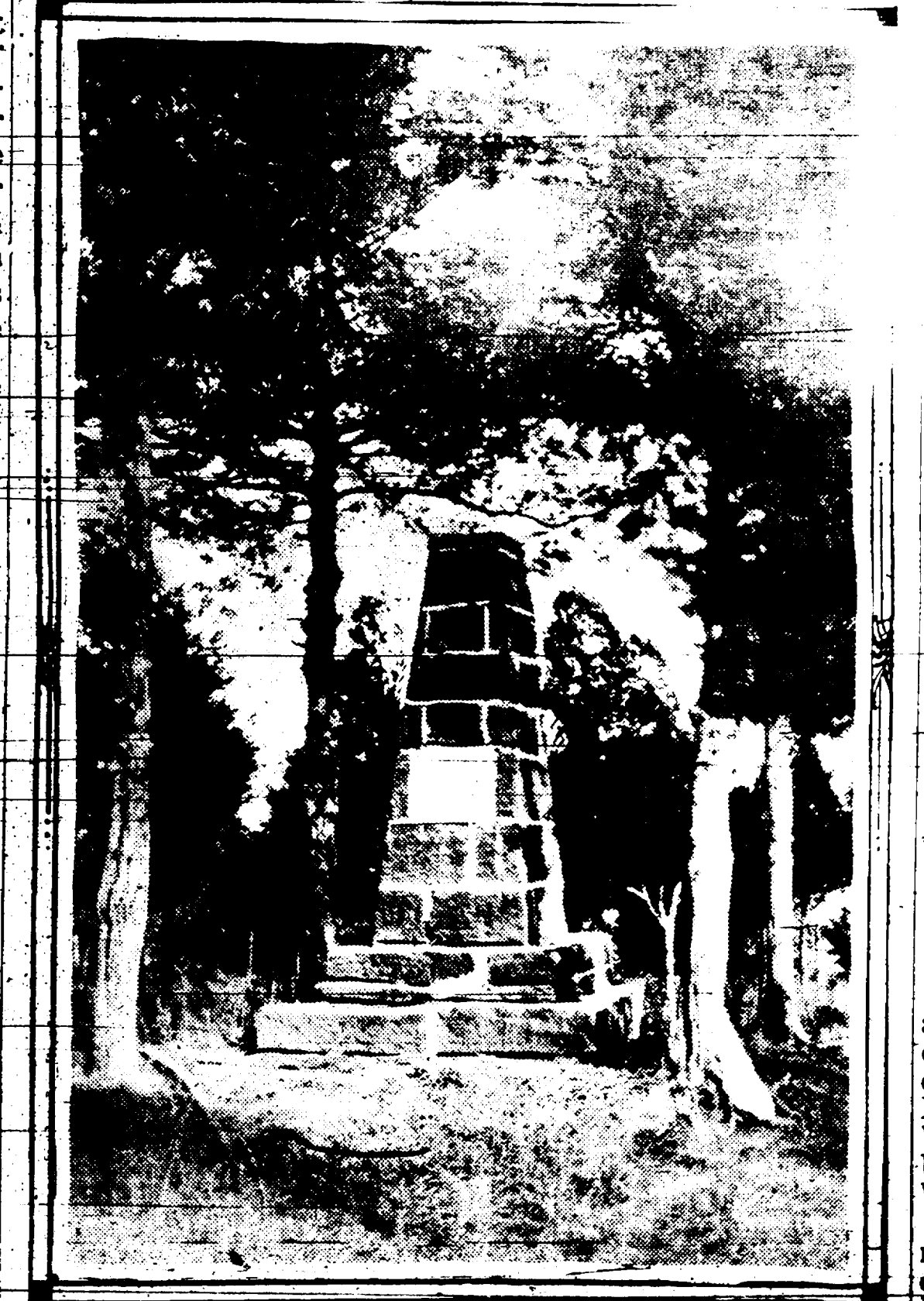

Ordinances Governing the Maintenance, Operation and Use of Water Works, Sewer and Electric Lights.

PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMITTEE
SECTION 1. A committee of three shall be elected by the Town Council at the beginning of each fiscal year to serve for a period of two years. Provided, the Committee selected by the present Council shall serve until September, 1915.
SECTION 2. This Committee shall be known as the Public Utilities Committee and shall have general control of the Water, Sewer and Electric Light Systems, acting through a Superintendent of Public Works, subject to the orders of said Committee.
SECTION 3. On or before the first day of September of each year, the Public Utilities Committee shall cause an inventory to be taken of all pipes, machinery and fixtures, owned by the Town, to be used by the improving Superintendent, and upon delivering them into the custody of the improving Superintendent, and file his receipt for the same, and fixtures therefor furnished him on an account with the Superintendent and Clerk of the Council who will act as the Public Utilities Committee shall have the power to act in passing and approving applications for connection to and use of either Water, Sewer or Electric Light Systems and to order the execution of work required. And at the end of each month, the Committee shall submit to the Council a detailed report of all work and expenditures.
SECTION 4. The Committee to examine plumbers and grant plumbers' licenses. Sec. 5. The Committee not to collect nor disburse funds, but must control and appropriate funds for Committee use, to be disbursed by Treasurer.
SECTION 6. The Committee shall have power to make contracts for payment of expenses of maintenance, operation or extension of systems and other similar expenses.
SECTION 7. That the said Committee is authorized and empowered to require any person licensed to practice the business of plumbing in the Town of Manassas, before engaging in the said business, to file with such number of surety the sum of two thousand (\$2,000) dollars, and with such number of sureties as the said Committee shall determine, conditioned upon the faithful performance of all work in accordance with the provisions of any and all laws of Manassas shall be kept harmless from the consequences of any and all acts of the said licensee during the period covered by the said bond.
SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC WORKS
SECTION 1. The Town Council shall employ a Superintendent of Public Works, who will be subject to the orders of the Public Utilities Committee in addition to his duties of laying pipes, erecting fire hydrants, making house connections, stringing electric wires and poles, and all other apparatus in the maintenance, extension, operation and use of the system of Water, Sewer and Electric Lights, will have general control of all lands, buildings, boilers, machinery, reserves, tanks and towers, pipe lines, hydrants, valves, meters, disposal plant, electric light systems and all other apparatus of either system and be responsible for the proper care and maintenance of the same.
SECTION 2. The Town Council to employ a sufficient number of operatives, mechanics and laborers, in addition to the property maintained by the Superintendent, at salaries to be fixed by the Council.
SECTION 3. The Superintendent to be vested with the power of Police to prevent damage to or misuse of any part or appliance of either system and to make arrest of any person violating these ordinances.
SECTION 4. The Superintendent of Public Works shall have a set of books, kept himself, for the purpose of recording and accounting for all materials, supplies, and fixtures purchased for use on the Water Works, Sewers and Electric Light Systems, and the names, titles and wages of all employees and laborers. Also a record of fees chargeable to a property owner for making connections to either system or cutting off said connection, or repairing the same, as provided for under these ordinances.
SECTION 5. On the day preceding the regular meeting of the Town Council in each month, the Superintendent shall make a written report to the Public Utilities Committee, stating the general condition of the systems, the quantity of all materials, supplies, fixtures and labor used or contracted for by the Town.
SECTION 6. The Superintendent to disconnect or "cut-off" any consumer, from either system, who has failed to pay for the monthly rental of water, for payment, as stated in these ordinances. And he shall not re-connect a delinquent consumer with either system until the punitive fee required in the bill rendered has been paid to the treasurer.
SECTION 7. All operatives, plumbers, foremen or laborers doing work for the Town upon the Water Works, Sewers or Electric Light Systems, are to be under the direct orders of the Superintendent of Public Works and he shall regulate, inspect, approve and record any connection with the said systems, and shall have authority to suspend or expel any operative or laborer who may hereafter be passed, and when inspecting house-plumbing or sewer-wiring, he shall be guided by the Standard Rules of Plumbing and the International Regulations for electric wiring as adopted by the Town.
SECTION 8. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent, under the direction of the Committee, to inspect or cause to be inspected, all houses when in course of construction or repair, in said Town, to see that the plumbing, drainage and installation of sewers therein conform to the following regulations.
APPLICATION FOR SERVICE
SECTION 1. An application for the privilege of connecting with and using Water or Sewer or Electric Light Systems shall be made in writing, and signed by the owner of the property to be served or his authorized agent, and addressed to the Public Utilities Committee, stating the location of the property, the number and kind of water-using fixtures with which connection is desired, the number of electric lights to be wired up and the location of any waste liquid proposed to be discharged into the public sewers.
SECTION 2. Blank forms of applications will be furnished upon request by the Superintendent of Public Works and when properly made out and signed by the applicant, the same, with the fee thereon, shall be filed with the Public Utilities Committee and then constitute a formal permit to make the connections desired, according to the provisions of these ordinances.
FINES IMPOSED
SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to injure, deface or destroy the pipes lines of the Water or Sewer System, of said town, or to open, remove, deface or destroy any well, fire plug, gate valve, shaft pipe, fitting or any other fixture connected or pertaining to or used in connection with the water or sewer tank, rotating disposal plant, electric light poles, wires, sewers, or electric light system, of said town; or to do anything that will contaminate the water at the said intakes, or to throw or deposit any garbage or refuse into any sewer, or to do anything that will be found guilty shall pay a fine of not more than ten (\$10.00) dollars, or be fined imposed to go to the person furnishing the evidence on which the same is based.
SECTION 2. The Committee may grant to any poor person (without charge) license to use the water from any public well, or to erect a water system on the premises of the occupier thereof. The Superintendent shall keep a list of licenses granted under this Section.
RESERVOIRS
The Treasurer of the Town to collect, disburse, and account for all revenues and expenses according to the list of consumers and amounts due from each as kept by the Superintendent. The treasurer to notify the Superintendent of delinquent consumers who fail to pay their bills within the interval of time in these ordinances.
WATER ORDINANCES
SECTION 1. In addition to his duties of laying down pipes, erecting fire hydrants, or any other work necessary to be done by the Superintendent, the Superintendent shall be the Engineer in Charge of the entire system under the control of the Public Utilities Committee, have general control of all lands, buildings, reservoir, tank and tower, pipe lines, hydrants and all machinery belonging thereto, and be responsible for the proper care and maintenance of the same.
SECTION 2. Upon complying with the conditions of making application for connection to the water supply and the payment of a fee of three (\$3.00) dollars, the Superintendent will deliver to the private owner the permit required by the Ordinance of the Town, but the introduction of said permit shall be made under the direction of the Superintendent and by a qualified plumber who shall use said pipe, fittings and material fully according to the Ordinance of the Town, and the same shall be returned to the Superintendent within forty-eight (48) hours after completion of the work, and before the said water is turned on. Failure to comply with the conditions of the Ordinance renders party in default.
SECTION 3. All services must be provided with a stop cock on owner's premises. When necessary water may be stopped without opening stop water meter. After permission to connect with water has been granted, the Superintendent shall be responsible for the proper care and maintenance of all lands, buildings, reservoir, tank and tower, pipe lines, hydrants and all machinery belonging thereto, and be responsible for the proper care and maintenance of the same.
SECTION 4. All work to be done on the property of the Town, or on any property owned by the Town, shall be done by the Town's workmen, or by a plumber employed by the Town, and at the expense of the Town, a plumber to be employed by the Town to place the pipe and fixtures.
SECTION 5. All three-fourth inch corporation cock tapped into the main pipe in the
