

#### Modern Paul Revere Rides to Manassas

Quantico, Va., May 18.—First Litut John Craig, post athletic officer, as a newspaper man in civil life has been given many difficult assignments by metropolitan dailies, including war corresponding and such epochal events as the migration some years ago of 300,-600 hoboes from the East and Middle West to Reno, Nev., which he covered for the New York World, but it has remained for the marine corps to hand him his hardest one in connection with the first military wedding celebrated

at this post.
The bride was Miss Elizabeth Anderson, of Catawba, Va., a town in the southern part of the state, while the groom was Private John E. Smith, of the Third replacement batallion, which had just received orders to leave the following day for an embarkation point overseas. The ceremony was performed by Chaplain E. B. Niver. Maj. Williams, of the re-placement battalion, gave the bride in marriage and most of the groom's comrades in arms attended the ceremony, which was cele-

brated in the post gymnasium.

Long Ride for License.

Not the least interesting feature of the wedding was provided by the peculiarity of the Virginia marriage laws, which made it necessary for Lieut. Craig to act as a combination Paul Revere and Cupid-on-Horseback to secure a marriage license for the pair.

He accomplished the feat, but in so doing was forced to ride all night and covered 72 miles, getting lost in the swamps between this camp and Humphreys on his way to and from Manassas, the county seat.

It came about in this manner. On Monday afternoon rumors were flying thick and fast that the replacement battalion would shove off on the following evening. The wedding had been decided upon, but it was expected that it would be held on Wednesday or Thursday. However, with the possibility that the groom would be called upon to leave for France within 24 hours, all hands agreed that the ceremony must be performed on Tuesday afternoon at the latest.

Train Connections Impossible. On consulting timetables it was found that it would be impossible to make train connections in time to get to Manassas, the county seat, where alone the all-important license could be obtained and back to Quantico in time, while a heavy rain had made the roads impassable to automobile and mo-

torcycle traffic. The only possible way remaining to get to Manassas and back in time for the ceremony was to send some one on horseback.

The distance by direct route is 26 miles each way, but no one could be found who knew the road and the storm had nearly obliter- DE ated the road in many places, and hesides, the night was pitch dark and thick clouds seemed to threaten a downpour.

Horse Had to Swim.

It was finally decided that the post athlete officer, Lieut. Craig, should be sent and at 10 p. m. he started, reaching Manassas at 3 in the morning., after losing his way and covering nearly 40 miles through the swamps and on the road in which the horse twice lost his footing and was obliged to

After securing the license the return trip was much easier, as it was daylight and the landmarks could be distinguished, a thing almost beyond possibility at night. Lieut. Craig arrived back in camp at 4:30 o'clock, just as guests were beginning to assemble for the ceremony.

Following the ceremony there was a tea in the Hostess House, after which the bride and bridegroom left in an ambulance as the guests of honor on one of the shortest honeymoons on record— a trip around the post—Washingon Post.
