NEWS TERSELY TOLD. PARAGRAPHS CONDENSED FOR QUICK READING. Many Items of Interest From All Parts of the World Are Here Given as Kernels Without the Chaff. Charles S. Hazeltine, United States Consul at Milan, has resigned. Eight hundred weavers struck at Clinton, Mass., because of reduction in wages. Police Captain Edward Fieve of the Oak street station, New York, died of apoplexy on Monday. George Torrey, the oldest newspaper man in Kalamazoo, Mich., is dead aged sixty-six years. The Union League Club of New York has opened a subscription for the benefit of the Nebraska star. Auguste Vacquerie, the dramatic author, poet and journalist, is dead in Paris. He was in his seventy-ninth year. James B. Gentry, the murderer of the actress, Madge York, is still alive and the chances are that he will recover. Thomas Burnat, a highwayman who robbed a stage near Oroville, Cal., was captured and sentenced to life imprisonment. The Berlin Kreuz Zeitung says that the court-martial of Von Kotze, implicated in the letter scandal, will begin on February 21. The Texas wife murderer, E. W. Hunt, has escaped the gallows. The Governor has commuted his sentence to life imprisonment. George Weaver and his wife, an old couple living alone on a farm seven miles west of Dayton, O., were found dead in their dwelling. During a quarrel at Omaha Neb., John Mathews, an ex-regular army soldier, shot and killed his wife and also shot himself. Mrs. Horace E. Pope and William Brusseau were both shot for the murder of Dr. Pope, the husband of the former. Editors Declard, Girard, Miller, Dreyfus, Portails, of Paris, France, were fined and sentenced to short terms of imprisonment for blackmail. Ray Knight, a six-year-old son of Leonard Knight, while playing on the ice on Cayuga Creek, near Waverly, N. Y., fell into the water and drowned. During the progress of a small fire at Niagara Falls, Chief Fireman Cole, Firemen Harry Williams and Herman Weber were seriously injured by a falling ladder. Charles W. Mook, manager of Overholt & Co.'s distillery at Bradford, Pa., was murdered by two men at Conneville, Pa. He will probably recover. Patrick McCaffrey, an old man, a laborer and poor, has laid claim to the half million dollar estate of John McCaffrey, late of Chicago, saying that John was his brother. Coburg is the only city in the German Empire that has declined to celebrate Bismarck's eightieth birthday. The Board of Health of the city of London has proposed to the city council a proposition to close the city of London to the entry of all foreign goods. The dairy farm of R. H. Saxon, of O'Hara township, near Pittsburg, Pa., was burned. Fourteen cows, four horses and other valuable property were also burned. Loss \$10,000, no insurance. M. Michaels, a wealthy citizen of Corry, Pa., committed suicide by hanging. The day was set for opening his new hotel, the Imperial, which had built at considerable expense. Worry was the cause. Ernest Clark, a messenger in the employ of the Canada Life Insurance Company at Hamilton, Ont., was given a package containing \$20,000 worth of negotiable coupons to mail at the post-office. Clark claims he lost the package in some way unknown to himself. The police are investigating.
