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

"The brave men who lost their lives on the battlefield of Manassas are to be honored with a memorial. It will be dedicated to the heroes of the North as well as the South, and will be a fitting tribute to those who fell in the Bull Run engagements. While a Confederate association will have charge of the memorial, there is to be nothing sectional in its policy or scope. Blue as well as Gray will be honored in what is planned to be one of the most significant memorials in Washington's vicinity.

"Sufficient funds have been raised already to make a start on the project. More money will have to be subscribed, but there is no doubt this will be forthcoming soon. The South itself is ready to raise all the money needed, yet there may be many big contributions from the North. Evidence of this was shown in the recent contribution of \$10,000 from a Bostonian, who is a relative of a former Confederate general.

"The days of sectionalism have passed, a fact of which the Manassas memorial park movement is a striking example. The North and South, united on everything now that affects us as a nation, will unite on this project, too, and bring it to a successful consummation. Thus will honor be paid to the faller heroes, not of one section and by one section of the country, but to North and South alike, and by the whole nation. The Manassas memofial as a tribute to valor will become one of our great patriotic

WHY NOT MORE ROAD WORK LIKE THIS?

Those who motored over the road from Manassas to the Hen House Thursday of last week must have noticed the road improvements that had been made the fore part of the week, under the urge established vulcanizing business and with the assistance of C. J. Meetze. With no stupendous amount of Manassas of work and at no great expense, the road from town to the Stone House was put in much better shape.

Approaches to bridges, where the roadway connects with them, were graded; a very bad rut about half the way out from town was filled over so that automobiles can now pass comfortably; at least one bridge was repaired, and the numerous gulleys formerly found running lengthwise of the road just before reaching the battlefield, were nearly

Why not more road work like this in Prince William? Why could not this road have been fixed like this several months ago instead of just last week? The point I am driving at is this: There is a great deal that can be done in the way of improving our roads, even where there is no state money available. Instead of occasionally scraping the roads mile after mile, regardless of the places that may already be in fairly good shape, why not put what money the county has to spend on roads in fixing up the spots that really are a menace to traffic and a disgrace to our old county of Prince William?

It looks to me as though it were more a matter of viewpoint than anything else—whether we aim to first fix up the bad places and fix them right, or whether we are to go along and spread the money out thinly over good and bad places, not improving the good places much and practically throwing the money away as far as the bad places are




