


territory were based on the discovery of the Columbia river in 1792 by Captain Bobert Gray, who sailed from Boston in the ship Columbia to open up fur trade. Many American fur traders followed and in 1811 John Jacob Astor, the head of the Pacific Fur company, established a settlement called Astoris at the mouth of the Columbia. The real opening of the Northwest was the result of the famous Lewis and Clark expedi-

emigrants from the East travelled over the Oregon Trail from Kansas City to the Columbia river, and thus into Oregon. The trip over this route occupied about three months and the settiers generally travelled in large parties to withstand any possible attacks from Indians. American settlers became so numerous that the United States actively laid claim to this region. Spain had been forced to withdraw any rights she may have had when Florida was ceded in 1819. This left England and America quarrelling over this section of the country. Final settlement, with definite boundaries between the United States and Canada, was made

The op strong the Kansas-Nebraska bill was passed in 1854, making this vital question optional with the inhabitants in each preposed state. With this law in force, the two factions actively started colonizing Kansas. Immigrants from the slave states of Arkan-

eas and Missouri immediately founded Leavenworth. The Massuchusetts Emigrant Aid society sent out anti-slavery settlers, who founded Lawrence, Topeka and other towns. Conflict between these two parties broke out at once, and it was only put down by the intervention of federal troops. The Northern settiers came in such numbers that they soon were in the majority and in 1881 an anti-slavery constitution was adopted, so Kansas was admitted to the Union in

For the town council, in regular session, to pass a resolution endorsing the formation of a local chamber of commerce and then stop there, would be nice, but would it be of much lasting benefit? Would it even get enough business men out to talk the matter over?

S Granting that the present state of the town's finances are not such as to really warrant any sizeable appropriation, the best encouragement the town council can give local business men to get together for the promoting of Manassas' business interests is to make as much of an appropriation as it can towards the employment of a paid secretary for a local chamber of commerce.

Without a paid secretary there is really little use for us to attem the organization of a local chamber of commerce. A chamber of will profit. commerce worth a "continental" is one that is live and on the job, an up and doing. Did you ever hear of a live chamber of comm where the fellow who did most of the work did not get paid for his tires. Try them next time.

With the town council leading the way with an appropriation and with an appeal made to each business man to contribute also towards the salary of a secretary, in proportion to the amount of the average nassas. business done annually during the past five years, it is possible we could start a local chamber of commerce that would "stay started," and with the expense to each supporter at a very low figure.
