

KNOW YOUR TOWN'S LAWS

Editor's Note—To refresh the minds of the citizens of Manassas with the laws of the town, the NEWS will each week publish a portion of the Code of the Town of Manassas, as was brought out in booklet form in 1918.

CODE OF THE TOWN OF MANASSAS.

(Continued from last week.)
Sec. 109. No person shall cause to be sunk or shall use any vault or well as a receptacle for a privy or water closet. Any person violating this section shall be fined not less than one, nor more than ten dollars.

Sec. 111. Any person committed to jail for the non-payment of any fine imposed by the Mayor or other lawful authority may be required to work on the streets, as provided by an ordinance passed on the fourth day of October, 1901.

Sec. 112. The following milk ordinance was adopted at a regular meeting of the Council on September 26, 1921, and takes the place of Section 76 of the Code:
Be it ordained by the Council of the Town of Manassas, Virginia:
1. That no person, firm or corporation shall sell, exchange or deliver, or offer to sell, exchange or deliver, or have in his custody for the purpose of offering for sale, exchange or delivery, any milk unless and until he has obtained a permit therefor from the Board of Health.

Sec. 94. No person shall drive or propel or cause to be driven or propelled any automobile, horseless or motor vehicle, or bicycle upon any street, avenue, alley or public highway, within the town of Manassas, at a greater speed than twelve miles an hour, between intersecting streets, avenues or alleys nor across the street, at a greater speed than eight miles per hour, nor around the corner of any street, avenue or alley, at a greater speed than six miles per hour.

Sec. 95. Every such permit shall be revoked by the failure of the holder thereof to comply in every respect with the provisions of this ordinance, and in addition to having such permit revoked any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not less than twenty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense. Section 76 of the Code of the town of Manassas is hereby repealed.

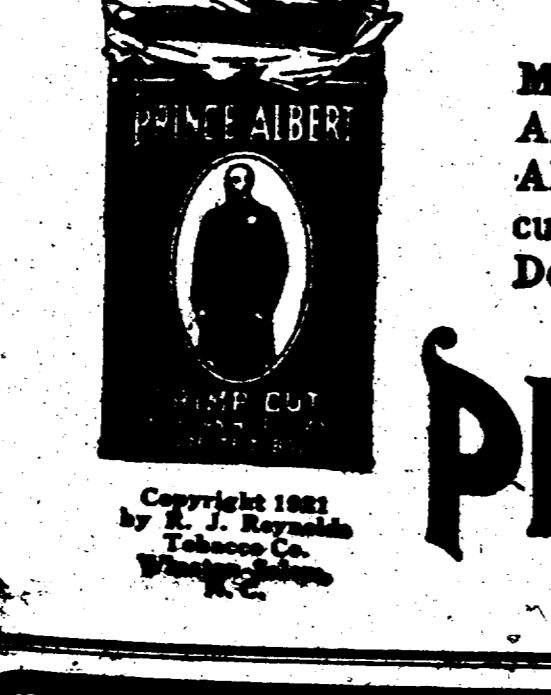

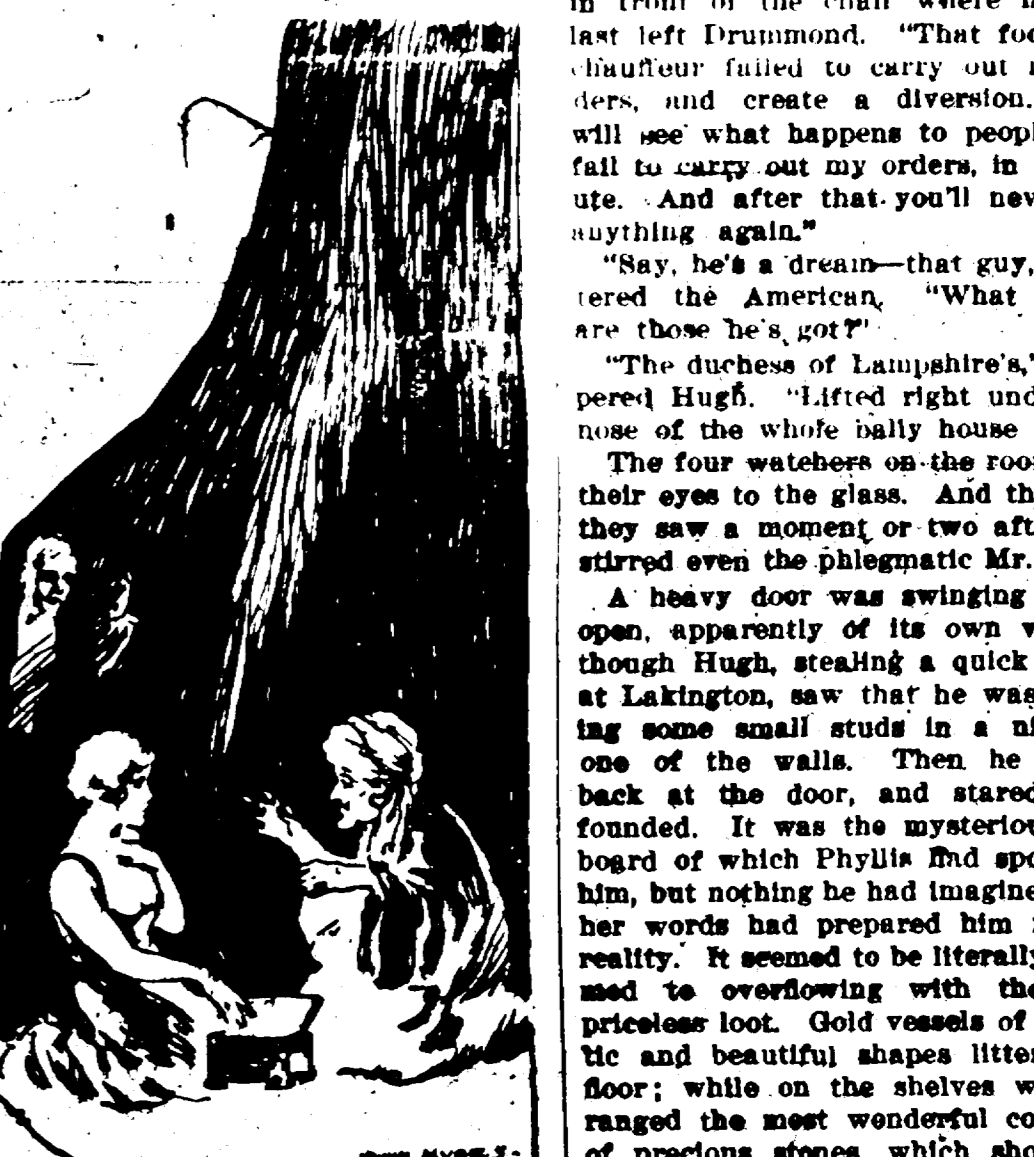

DO YOU REALIZE THE GRAVITY OF IT? Think of it! There are approximately 30,000 persons in Virginia today suffering from active tuberculosis. Each of these active cases, according to state health authorities, constitutes a real menace to the commonwealth, if they do not take every means to prevent the spread of this decidedly infectious disease.

Some idea of the losses due to tuberculosis in Virginia can be gleaned from the fact that although 1920 showed the lowest tuberculosis death rate, there were in that year two and one-half times as many deaths from the "white plague" alone as from the next seven most dangerous infectious diseases, smallpox, diphtheria, measles, whooping cough, scarlet fever, malaria and typhoid fever, combined.

CANCER WARNING

American Society for Control of This Dread Disease Gives Some Ways of Detecting and Controlling It.

Last week was given over to widespread discussion of the scourge of cancer. The following points are given to check the insidious onslaught of this most prevalent disease.

1. During the Great War the United States lost about 80,000 soldiers. During the same two years 180,000 people died of cancer in this country.

2. Many of these deaths are preventable, since cancer is frequently curable if recognized and properly treated in its early stages.

3. Cancer begins as a small local growth which can often be entirely removed by surgical means.

4. Cancer is not a communicable disease. It is not possible to "catch" cancer from one who has it.

5. Cancer is not inherited. It is not certain even that a tendency to the disease is inherited.

6. Every persisting lump in the breast is a warning sign.

7. The beginning of cancer is usually painless; for this reason its insidious onset is frequently overlooked.

8. In women continued abnormal discharge or bleeding requires the immediate advice of a competent doctor.

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10. Any sore that does not heal, particularly about the mouth, lip or tongue is a danger signal.

11. Persistent indigestion in middle life, with loss of weight, change of color, or with pain, vomiting of dark stools, call for thorough and competent medical advice.

12. Bismuth is a useful and promising means of treatment of some kinds of cancer.

13. Open warfare by open discussion will mean the prevention of many needless deaths from cancer.

14. The American Society for the Control of Cancer is a league joining the principle agencies and individuals in the United States and Canada who are striving to make headway against this formidable disease by a campaign of education.

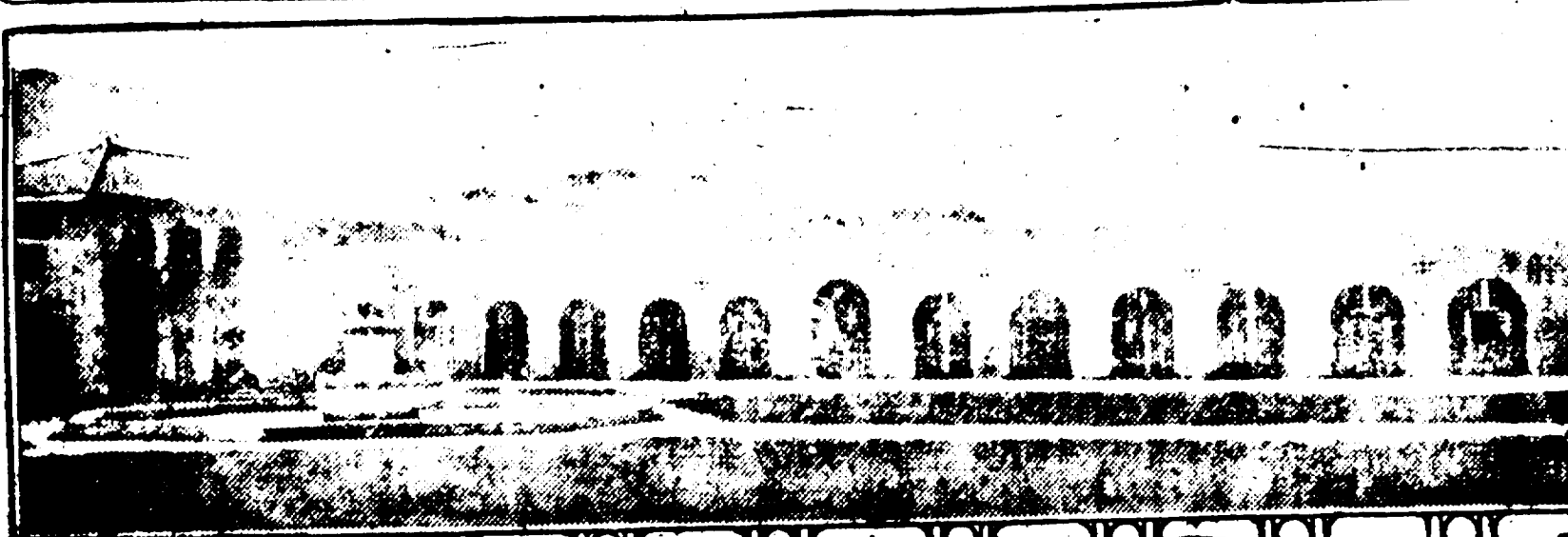
The Story of Our States. By JONATHAN BRACE. HISTORICAL. ARIZONA. A HISTORY OF THE STATE.

Southern Baptists Wage Vigorous Warfare Against Tuberculosis In This Section

In one of the most extensive fights that has ever been made by any religious body in America for the eradication of disease, Southern Baptists, through their Home Mission Board, have undertaken the task of combating tuberculosis in the 15 states comprising the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. The first step in this direction was the recent establishment of a tract of 145 acres at Paso, Texas, of the Southern Baptist Sanatorium, where \$500,000 from the 75 Million Campaign has been invested and where \$200,000 more will be placed by the end of the campaign period. The institution is located at an altitude of 4,500 feet on the side of St. Franklin and commands a splendid view of the mountains of New Mexico, Western Texas and Old Mexico. Dr. H. P. Vermillion is superintendent.

The death rate from tuberculosis in the South is the highest in the Nation as a whole. One reason for the exceedingly high death rate in the South is the great prevalence of the disease among the negroes who are especially susceptible to tuberculosis. The death rate among them being three and one-half times that among the whites. But inasmuch as the negroes will doubtless continue to be intimately associated with the whites in domestic and other work in the future, the whites will never be safe from infection until the negroes, as well as the whites, have been freed from the plague.

In addition to the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Southern Baptists have a string of 200 regular hospitals in operation and serve others under course of construction. This hospital property is valued at approximately \$7,000,000 and these institutions last year treated 44,000 patients. They also operate 15 orphanages in which approximately 1,000 orphan boys and girls are cared for, adopted and prepared for Christian citizenship.

\$10,000,000 AID FOR VETERANS

Red Cross Provides Friendly Service of Many Kinds to Army of Disabled.

BULK OF WORK BY CHAPTERS

2,397 of These Are Helping Ex-Servicemen Obtain Benefits U. S. Provides.

One field of Red Cross service alone, that of assisting disabled veterans of the World War, entails expenditures \$10,000,000 greater than the aggregate receipts of the Annual Roll Call of 1921. The American Red Cross announced in a statement urging a widespread increase in membership at the Annual Roll Call, November 11 to 24. At the present time National Headquarters and the nationwide chain of Chapters of the Red Cross is spending approximately \$10,000,000 annually for the relief of disabled ex-service men and their families, while the aggregate receipts from the Annual Roll Call were approximately \$4,000,000.

It is in the 2,280 of the 5,800 Red Cross Chapters which still are helping solve the veteran's problem of adjusting himself to a peaceful civilian status that the greater part of the cost of this service is borne. Of the total sum spent for veterans' relief last year, National Headquarters expended a total of more than \$2,000,000, while the remaining \$2,000,000 was contributed by 2,397 chapters in this country-wide effort to assist the Government in providing the aid sorely needed by these men and their families.

As the war expands, the disabled service man is ever-expanding and probably will not reach the peak before 1926, in the assertion of well-informed Government officials and the Red Cross. The latter organization is at its most important work in evidence confined to a particular section but in, on the contrary, nationwide. At the end of the fiscal year just ended, there were 26,500 disabled service men in the 1,892 United States Public Health Service, Contract and Government Hospitals and Soldiers Homes, and that number is increasing at a rapid rate.

Thousands of these men receiving medical treatment, compensation and other benefits from the Government, started their efforts to readjust themselves to civilian life. The Chapter, acting as the disabled man's agent in claims against Government, informs the man as to the procedure necessary to gain for himself that which is provided by the course of compensation. His application, including medical treatment and other benefits, is properly filed with the aid of the Red Cross Chapter.

Many forms of assistance are in delay before the man's needs are met. The Red Cross is ever ready to assist in the collection of these forms of himself and his family. To the man's gaining full benefit from the Government's plan is the Red Cross's chief aim. Entering the war-time hardship of every kind and the loss of his welfare is an experience of the Chapter. From the time that he enters, the man's needs are met, and advanced steadily in the months during the last year.

Red Cross has given the man one kind or another of an aid in his time of need. An indication of the work done in the months during the last year, Chapter 11 to be found in the fact that there were 20,544 requests for relief from the National Headquarters.

DIET OF FARMERS NEAR EAST RELIEF

Recent Studies by Home Economics Experts Throw Interesting Light on What Country Folks Eat.

American farmers seem to be as generously supplied with meat as any class in this country. It will seem surprising to city housewives that eggs are not used as abundantly on farms as among people at large. Milk is generously used, even though there are fewer dairies than the average in farm homes. Other plentiful dairy products assure farm families decided advantages over other groups.

These and other points about farm diet are brought out in studies recently made by the Bureau of Home Economics in co-operation with the Bureau of Markets and Crop Estimates of the Department of Agriculture, to show the food habits of typical American homes. Included in this survey are seventy-three farm families in different parts of the country, representing many types of agriculture.

These studies bear out the general impression that on the average, the farmers' families have an abundant diet with enough different kinds of food to insure their obtaining of the substances necessary to keep them in health. In more matter of bulk the farm families receive a generous amount of food a day; in comparison with the average for all families, which eat only fourteen and one-half pounds.

What any family eats depends, on what it has to choose from, what its members happen to like and dislike, and what it can afford. Local products were much more important before the days of quick transportation than at present.

Differences in the tradition of the various nationalities that have settled in this country have caused the West Indian, Mexican and Chinese diets. Much of the same kinds of foods can be produced throughout the Middle Atlantic states, but the early Pennsylvania Dutch settlers used to use American materials as they used similar ones in Germany.

The regional differences are decreasing to some extent because of the increased use of food products from other sections. Bananas and lemons and oranges from California and Florida, canned corn from Maine, sweet potatoes from New Jersey, cheese from Wisconsin, maple syrup from Vermont, flour from Minnesota, and crackers or breakfast food made anywhere are sold in most small towns at reasonable prices.
