Any person failing to secure said permit before interring the remains of anyone therein shall, upon conviction, be fined a sum not to exceed five dollars. The clerk shall in no instance, issue said permit until the party so applying shall have paid to the Treasurer of the town all fees or assessments made and due the said town as shall, from time to time, be provided for.

He shall keep the grass and other growth outside of the lots or sections properly trimmed and clear; and he shall mark off lots, avenues and walks and keep the same in good and proper condition. As long as the subject is constructive and one fit to be discussed by the entire family, we do not hesitate to give it publicity, even shough we may disagree altogether with the conclusions reached Our readers are entitled to all that is good and helpful, and especially such as will provoke thought that may lead to action that will be beneficial to both the individual and the community.

WHAT WE MAY EXPECT OF THE WASHINGTON CONFERENCE.

"What is the conference on the limitation of armaments going to amount to anyway?" That's a question a great many of us are asking ourselves and our friends quite frequently, now that representatives of the leading world powers are meeting in daily session at Washington to see what can be done to prevent wars in the future and to hold down the ever-increasing costs of keeping up competitive armies and navies. Of course, no one can give a hundred per cent answer to this question. This would be difficult enough a task were all the "secret sessions" stuff absent, but with the daily papers forced to pick up many of their reports largely from hearsay and from interviews granted by certain delegates who are but human and who too many times tell what they want to see told and withhold the telling of what they do not want to become public, we do not know how matters are progressing and whether or not any real progress is being made.

One thing sure, if any definite action should come out of this con ference, it will not be known for a certainty for many a month to come for the conference in itself has no power to put into operation any conclusions it may arrive at. And when the delegates get back to their respective homes and eventually announce to their respective governing bodies any decisions that possibly may be made in Washington, it will take the adverse action of but one or two such bodies to throw a monkey wrench into the whole works, and such a big monkey wrench that it would be well nigh an impossible task to repair the critical parts
