Marriage Age Advancing.

The average age of the community is becoming older. It was pointe, out by the president of the Reyal Statistical sectety recently. It is interesting to note that the age of marriage has also the same tendency. According to the availabe returns as many as 40, 000 girls marry in England in a year under the age of 21, that is, in less than one seventh of the marriages refletered. Thirty years, a generation ago, more than obe-fifth of the women marrying in a year were min-

Another interesting fact that seems to prove this tendency to later marriages is provided by the figures for the last decade. In 1907 the number of marriages of women between the ages of 12 and 25 was just over 6000 more than in 1898, while the marriages of women between the axes of 25 and 30 increased by just over 12,000.

The average or mean age of all spinsters who married in 1896 was 25 years and one month. This has advanced to 25 years and six and a baifmonths in the last available returns. Widows at their second and third marriages are also older, baving ad-Valiced from an average of 40 years and seven months to 40 years and 11 months.

Thus spinster brides are nearly six months and widow brides four months older than these of a few years ago-London Mail



To Control Mildew.

It is very well worth while to have some bushes of the big English gooseberries. They are enormous fruiters, he berries almost as big as plum and of fine flavor; but as stated they are subject to mildey. For years this was considered a fatal defect, new it is recognised that all that is necessary is to give the bushes a spraying early in the spring and at intervals later until bearing time. The spraying solution which has given the best resuits during neveral years of comparative trial by the New York Experiment Station is: One ounce of potantium sulphide to two or three gallons of water. This has proven superior to the Bordeeux-soda mixture or copper carbonate solution. The miles genecally makes the appearance during May or early June and it is first notieed in gilstening frosty spots on the young fruit and on the lower shaded nerts of the bush. Later the spots enlarge and turn brown. If the attack is bad, it will affect the young twigs sad may even destroy the husbes in a single year. As with all fungus discass, the attack is always worse in a wet year than during a dry season. It should be remembered that spraying against fungus is always mainly preventive, and that treatment must commance early in the sesson, before the




