

PROTEST AGAINST EXPOSURE

In reply to General Jones ic. ter General Foster, after summing up its contents, protested against the exposure of the Fed= eral officers referred to; even though women and children of Charleston were equally exposed, to the fire of his own guns, and closed with the information that ne had forwarded General Jones etter to President Lincoln with the request that an equal numner of Confederate officers, of like rank be placed in his custody to be subjected to the same danger from the fire of the Confederate guns in Charleston, so long as the Union officers referred to in jeneral Jones' letter were kept in their present quarters.



Out of the 600 tortured and humiliated heroes of many hard fought battles in defense of principles which they valued more than their lives, only seventeen showed "the white feather" by taking the oath of allegiance to the Federal government.
