





It is beld by the best authorities that Panouchi, as Pratt students make it,

calls for three tablespoonfuls of butter, a tiny pinch of soda and a cupful of milk, all heated together. Then three cupfuls of coffee and sogar are stirred in and a pinch of sait. The sirup is cooked to the soft ball stage, taken from the fire and cooled and then three-fourths of a cupful of nut. meats chopped fine and a teaspoonful of vanilla are mixed with it and it is stirred until creamy. After pouring into a shallow tin the candy should

be marked off in squares. For checolate chips as the same cooking teacher makes them the recipe wants half a cupful of butter, two eggs, two squares of checolate, a teaspoonful of vanilla, a quarter of a teaspoosful of salt, a cupful of sugar and a cupful of flour. Bake in thin sheets for ten or twelve minutes. If the passe is too stiff to headle, more liquid or less flour should be used. In making any such batter judgment has to be used.

For "brownies" a recipe copied from a Pratt student's notebook is as follows: A third of a cupful of butter, a fourth of a cupful of molasses, a cupfal of flour, a capful of chopped walnuts, a third of a cupful of sugar, an egg and a fourth of a teaspoonful of salt. Bake in a thin sheet on buttered

Browing Clover and Alfalfa.

FOR FARMERS

alfaifa will not do well upon a soil containing acid, says Hoard's Deiryman. Farmers who have been most successful in growing this crop have lowed it upon solle rich in lime or have applied lime in amounts sufficient to correct the acidity. Just how much lime should be put upon an acre depands upon the amount of organic acid he the soil. It ranges from 1,000 to 6,000 pounds per acre. Alfalfa is a plant very fond of lime, and it is not possible to bave a soff contain too much. Red clover and alaike clover do very well upon an acid soil, but we should healtate to advise any one to attempt to grow alfalfa upon a soil that contains any organic acid. So far as we know, the affaifa plant will grow upon such a soil, provided it is very rich in nitrogen: but, as a rule, it is desirable to ave the tubercies which live upon the roots of the alfalfa plant gather nitroin from the sir. These tilbercles will not be formed unless there are present in the soil aifalfa bacteria, and they do not thrive in a soil that is acid.

The Value of Alfalfa. A krower in southern Kanees who harvests about a thousand tons of alfalfa per year and is working with it nearly every day from the second week in May until Nov. 10 insists that sifaifa upder the same conditions of rainfall is much easier to save in fair feeding condition than red clover. He finds the side delivery rake especially excellent for turning over the green or wet windrows to the sun and air with the least loss of leaves, and cured thus. after being wet the natural color is better preserved. #### STREET FAIR EXHIBITS.

RESIDENTS of Manassas and Prince William County are cognizant that the Street Fair opening Monday, September 5, for one week is to be an Exposition in the truest sense of the term, representative of the entire community. Promoters of the enterprise are particularly desirous that the agriculture exhibits be complete. and while many entries have already been made there is room for others, and farmers who have not yet responded are earnestly requested to do so. This Fair, it is planned, will be the foundation for a Northern Virginia Agricultural Exposition to be held annually in Manassas, but co-operation is required to effect the proposition. Farmers who wish to exhibit their products will address Mrs. M. S. Moffett.

Fine displays of domestic handicraft are being received, the youngsters being especially active in the competition. They are entering into the rivalry with a desire to show their superior skill, although the prizes offered hold attraction. Prince William housewives plan preparing tempting specimens of cookery for the Fair, making the domestic department an exhibitional feature. Needlecraft, and china painting will occupy conspicuous places in the display.

Merchants of Manassas have responded liberally with contributions, attesting their determination to help make the fair a success. The leading business establishments are to be represented b typical floats in the parade on the afternoon of the opening day.

Aside from its value to Manassas and Prince-William County, as an exposition, the enterprise is worthy of support because the proceeds are to be devoted to an incidental school improvement Under direction of Mrs. M. S. Molfett, the public school pupils will direct every energy to making this event memorable, and all persons who attend will get full value for their money.

Never before in Manassas has a street exhibition of this magnitude been attempted, and from it citizens are determined shall develop one of the greatest expositions in this section of the coun-This can only be accomplished by maintaining the enthusi asm that now marks preparations in all departments for the big pal Street Fair.

#### TIME TO CONTRIBUTE

MORAL encouragement is required to give impetuse to a public enterprise, but it is substantial support that sustains the movement to realization. Solicitation has begun for subscriptions to the Prince William Hospital building fund and it is hoped that the enthusiasm which marked the inauguration of the project will be appreciably maintained when subjected to the financial test. Residents should contribute liberally and willingly to the establishment of an institution greatly, almost direly, needed in this community. There should be no occasion to employ either argument or persuasion in this Hospital fund campaign, although it is a proposition that involves a great risk. The risk is of life and health, and so it is the primal duty not alone a benevolence of every resident of mal extension work. All persons met Mr. Stonell at Occaquen, the community to contribute to the extent of his or her ability.

Prince William County is so remote from a Hospital that local patients requiring such service are compelled in addition to their suffering, to endure the tedium of a railroad journey either to chairman of committee. Washington or Charlottesville. Travel fatigue, and the shock of train operation and of being moved about in their extremely sensitive state, lessens chances of recovery, and occasionally is fatal. Then, too, emergency cases cannot be treated as successfully as though Hospital facilities were at hand. From a humanitaria point of view the Hospital proposition holds powerful appeal.

In mercenary light a contribution to the Hospital fund is simply an investment in a form of health and accident insurance. subscription is not a gift at all, being an advance payment for Hospital services when needed. Insurance of this kind is worth having. In the aggregate subscribers to the Prince William Hospital fund will benefit themselves, their fellowmen and their community.

Live Towns, like enterprising individuals, cannot be kept down large. no matter what influences are brought to bear against them. Manassas is a live Town that cannot be kept down. 
