



There died in Paris recently at the age of eighty-nine years a woman who will be remembered in the annals both of literature and of music. Her name was Pauline Vierdot Gereie. She was great in her own right and great by reason of her associations, says Current Literature. Her brother, Manuel Gercia, who died in 1909, was a singing teacher of worldwide reputation. In her prime she sang in all the leading opera houses of Europe. She knew intimately some of the most famous men and women of her time. Wagner. Schumann, Chopin, Goupod and Lisst were her friends, George Sand made er the become of a novel. Ary Scheffer painted her portrait. Heine, Renan, Delacroix, Adelaide Ristori and others as famous flocked to her salons. "She mirer in Musical America, "from the golden age, carrying the sucred fire During eighty-nine years her hand never wearied, her flame never fick ered." But her strongest claim on immortality lies not so much in what has been mentioned as in one other fact. She was the friend and inspirer of the man whom many regard as the greatest novelist that ever lived-Ivan Turgenieff.

The love story of Mme. Yiardot-Garcia and Turgenien has never been told in its entirety. Turgenieff had all the secretiveness of the Siev. and Mme. Viardot-Garcia when she gave her consent in 1907 to the publication of some of the letters that passed between them excised the most vital passages. 

#### DEATH OF SENATOR DOLLIVER

THE death of United States Senator Jonathan Prentiss Dolliver of Iowa, is a serious loss to Republican progressives, and his place in the Senate probably will be taken by a regular Republican to be appointed by Governor Carroll. Senator Dolliver was a gifted orator, his speeches being veritable word pictures. Then, too, h was quick in debate, witty and resourceful. He was safe and conservative in counsel. In the greatest speech of his career last June he pronounced the tariff law a robber, and arraigned the Administration and Senator Aldrich. He never neglected an opportunity to score nomen against the Administration. He was a fearless relentless antagonist. Senator Dolliver was chairman of the Committee on Agriculture and Forestry. He was a friend of conservation and it was to him that Former Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot wrote the letter that led to his dismissal from the service by President Taft. 


