ADVISE USE OF KING DRAG ON ROADS

Members of Farmers Institute Discuss Benefits of Device-Suggest Corn Growing Contest.

The method, is, -in brief, to heat the can for two consecutive days for an hour in a receptable filled with boiling water. The first heating kills the active bacteria, the second kills those that were in the spore-form on the first day.




