DEMOCRATIC LEAGUE AGAINST GANG

THE VIRGINIA DEMOCRATIC LEAGUE has just issued an address to the voters of the State, appealing to them to drive ring rule and political bossism from the State. The address declares openly that 'a few officials holding high places, contemptuous of the rank and file of the party by whose suffrance they hold place and power, have organized within our party a secret organization commonly called a ring, with the object of filling the positions of the DO THE BIDDING OF THE OLIGARCHY.

The address is of peculiar interest to the people of Prince William County, who now are engaged in a campaign against ring rule and political bossism. The text of the address follows:

TO DEMOCRATS OF VIRGINIA.

Deplorable and indefensible party conditions affecting the welfare of our State compel us to appeal to you. We believe in a government by party, but not in a government for party. We believe in party organization, but that it should be the servant, and not the master, of party; and that it should fairly and impartially administer party affairs, giving equal right and opportunity to every Democrat, and a fair and open field to all who honorably contest for sub-

By the violation of these plain Democratic principles, our Democratic organ ization has been transferred into the organ of faction, thereby degenerating into a cabel or machine or ring, usurping and misusing party anthority, and undermining the confidence of the people in our party and its principles. Against such abuses we invoke your aid and patriotic condemnation.

A RECENT COMBINATION.

A few officials holding high places, contemptuous of the rank and file of the party by whose suffrance they hold place and power, have organized within our party a secret combination, commonly called a ring, with the object of filling the positions of the party, as well as the offices of the people, with those only who will do the the bidding of this oligarchy. Submission to the orders of these usurpers of party centrol, rather than patriotism and ability and fidelity to the clean and strong and the hands willing for honest work. The party and the people, has become the chief qualification for office, thereby degrading the public service into a matter of mere incident and tending to keep out of public life many of the most gifted and unselfish members of our party. In the estimation of this cabal, it is now a crime against party loyalty to seek popular favor or public place without first securing the consent of the ring, while it boldly dietates policies without consulting others having an equal right to determine them.

Popular rights and defenses are swept aside to secure this sinister control Laws to prevent the corrupt payment of poll taxes and other illegal practices have been obstructed or defeated. The mandate of our constitution and the resolution of our State convention for the enactment of just primary election laws, so framed to give the poorest citizen an opportunity to offer for office, and so safeguarded as to insure an honest election, have been either covertly or openly opposed, thus leaving the people to the tender mercies of the criminal manipulators of the ballot.

In consequence of such contempt of individual rights and neglect of public needs, it becomes impossible to know when an honest return of our primary election has been made; and the moral sense of the people is shocked by revelations so reveiting that our State Democratic committee is ashemed to publish the fasts upon which its verdict of mility is hased, and the people are slarmed at the seguing impossibility of securing convictions under the law.

STATE CAPITAL NOW AT WASHINGTON.

Potentially the seat of our State capitol has been moved from Richmond t Washington. When legislation is desired or opposed, by when appointments to office are favored or disapproved, scant attention is shown to the State capitol. but the Washington ring is at once sought as the author and finisher of legislation and administration. Thus the ring controls the springs and powers of goverament. But this deference of subservience of the legislative and executive departments of our government to the ring is not the whole evil; for as night | in climb. follows day there must soon follow the enfeeblement, and then the dependence of our judiciary. Why not? Has it not occurred wherever this system of pelitics pravails? And are we better and stronger than others? We demand a return of the government to the people. We appeal for civic righteousness. The issue has passed beyond mere political expediency. We, therefore, appeal to the Democrats of Virginia to organize to secure good government with the same zeal with which the enemies of popular rule have organized for their own selfish interests. 
