





The property of J. H. Whealton, of Whealton, in Lancaster county, comprising a 400-acre farm, storehouse, hotel, five dwellings, canning house, large schooner, gasolene boat, stock of merchandise, lots in Norfolk and oyster property on the Eastern Shore of Virginia, was sold at public auction Friday at Whealton by Trustees L. E. Mumford Frank, G. Newbill, R. O. Norris, Jr., and John F. Gouldman Jr. The aggregate sum realized from the combined sales was \$22,000.

The bronze statue of Jefferson which occupies the esplanade on the north side of the rotunda at the University of Virginia, was smeared with yellow paint some time during Saturday night and the figures surrounding the Liberty Bell, upon which the statue is imposed, and the bell itself were disfigured with a blue paint. The large pedestal of Italian marble did not escape. On the head was placed an inverted vessel of stone china, also colored with yellow and blue smudge.




