MILLER TRAIN CONTROL SUCCESS

Stope Locomotive Running at Full Speed Prince William County People Investors in Corporation.

The Danville Commercial-News of Wednesday, August 16, gives the following description of the test, which is of great interest to who are investors in the train control corporation:

CONTROL WORKS PERFECTLY "Stopping within a distance of two hundred feet, a train running at the rate of 35 miles an hour is the latest accomplishment of the Miller train control on its second preliminary trial in the C. & E. I. yards at Oaklawn at 11:15 o'clock Wednesday morn-

At 11:15 o'clock engine No. 382 in charge of engine tamer Jack Warren and equipped with the Miller train control, pulled out of the round house and into the yards west of the shops where a temporary ramp had been erected for the purpose of giving the device a thorough test. The ramp was placed, as is required, eighteen inches from the rail and extended for 170 feet along the side of the track. "It was but a temporary affair and showed signs of having been hastily erected yet it proved sufficient to show the workings of the train control. W. B. Murray, the engineer of the Mile Train Control corporation, who is superintending the test of the device here, connected a number of batteries onto the ramp and also the rail and arranged them so that he was able to disconnect them at will.

Nebuchadneszar was a great general in 605, in his first seige of Jeruselem, and became sole emperor B. C. 604. He made Dabylon glorious during his reign of 43 years. He was in his 18th year when he began this

of 20,000 inhabitants. Against the huge engines of Asiatic warfare the besteged citizens constructed counterengines; and the struggle was worthy of the occasion—a combat or duel not only of courage, but of skill and intelligence, between Babylon and Jerusalem. Houses were demolished, that new walls might be built of their materlals, inside each spot weakened by the battering-rams.

The ramparts were vigorously defended by archers and slingers, equal in bravery to those of the Chaldeans. The rams were caught, when possible, by doubled chains or ropes to weaken size them. Lighted torches and firebrands were thrown on their roofs and on those of the catapults, to set were regiously defended against the offorts of the enemy to burst them open or to burn them.

At last there was no food for the people, and famine prevailed

The houses were full of the sick and vounded; bloody lights between contending parties, as to surrendering or holding out, crowded the streets with fresh horrors; the roar of the stege night and day filled the air. A breach was made in the city, at midnight. The princes of the king of Babylon came in the generals and high offcials, Nebuchnessar himself was at Riblah in Hamath and the Chaldeans burned the king's house, and the houses of the people, with fire, and brake down the walls of Jerusalem.

PUBLIC PARK

Profosals of the Civic Improvement League for a public park will be greeted with response, enthusiastic and substantial, from citizens who, through the very absence of civic improvement of that nature, recognize the importance, therefore the necessity of an attractive spot set apart for recreation. Years ago when the Town was founded, and again during each succeeding epoch of development suggestions have expressed the desire and plans have anticipated the final acquisition of a public park in Manassas. Unfortunately then, or fortunately it may now be, in view of more extensive present plans, one propositions failed to materialize, leaving clear of restrictions and limititations the way to park improvement adequate for a Town that now is building a future of brilliant wonderful promise. The straggling, struggling village then presented no evidences of a possible development into the prosperous, progressive Manassas of today. But the pioneers of this Town builded better than they knew, though not better than they hoped.

It has remained, most opportunely, for the Civic Improvement League to actualize suggestions for improvements that while needed were regarded as rather improbable, at least for some time to achieve, a task to which we can gladly devote every power that is come. SENATOR MARTIN OFFERS NO PROOF TO MEET THE ISSUE what is the proof which leads those gentlemen to declare him worthy of "confidence?" Mr. Martin has furnished no proof. He has rested content with his mere denials. He could not have furnished any less proof, for no one has been so silly as to expect a confession from him. Denials in matters of this kind are not generally regarded as of much weight.
