These men, as jurors, will pronounce-judgment of guilt or innocence upon Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., on trial for murder of his young and beautiful wife. There is no doubt in the minds of many that Beattie is guilty. So closely has the prosecution traced the movements of Beattie on that fatal night, that all but confession has been wrung from his unwilling lips. Paul Beattie purchased a gun, according to his testimony, for his cousin, Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., three days before the murder.






