

HE TOWN COUNCIL in special session Monday night unofficially approved the proposition of Charles Farnan, of Phila delphia, to install an electric light and water plant in Manassas. However the proposal was not accepted unofficially until principa clauses of a counter-proposition by the Council were incorporated into the document. Through such amendment it was verbally agreed that the proposed annual tariff of \$350 on water for firefighting purposes is to be removed when 200 signatures are affixed to the subscription for light and 200 to the subscription for water; and the promoters agree to remove all charges for water for firefighting service when a sewer system in constructed; when water is furnished free for fighting purposes the Company proposes a charge of 15 cents per 1,000 gallons for water for street sprinkling purposes; the Company is to supply free water for two public drinking fountains and four automatic fountains for animals. With these amendments the proposition submitted by Mr. Farnum was verbally approved.


