Political forecasters and explainers are confounded by the evidence of the split tickets.

Maryland elected a Republican Governor and a Democratic Leg islature, the frauds in the recent State primaries arousing voters to repudiation of the political bosses, and the breaking up of a powerful machine.

Massachusetts elected a Democratic Governor, the second Dem ocratic State executive to be re-elected since the Republican party came into power in that State fifteen years ago. Senators Lodge and Crane were defeated.

Kentucky again is Democratic, electing former Senator Mc Creary Governor by a majority of more than 20,000, and a Democratic Legislature by a wide margin. . New Jersey elected a Republican legislature.

The Democrats scored sweeping victories in Ohio. Newton D. ment of President Taft, was defeated for re-election. The entire glass of sods water. This guarantee includes the ladies. Democratic ticket was elected in Cleveland. Columbus elected Democratic mayor, and fifty-one progressive delegates to the con stitutional convention, assuring this faction a majority, and make ten in the new Ohio constitution. Chicago swept out the machines in the city judicial elections Of the ten superior court justices elected, six were Republicans. Rhode Island elected the entire Republican ticket

cratic Presidential nomination as a result of these victories.

In San Francisco the Good Government party elected sixteen of the eighteen members of the board of supervisors.

Returns from New York show that the entire Democratic ticket was elected in New York county, although it suffered elsewhere throughout the greater city. The next State Legislature on the face of the returns will be Republican:

- Rudolph Blankenburg, the reform candidate, defeated George overcoming a plurality of 125,000.

Throughout the State the shake-up was in no manner sensational although some of the changes were rather surprising. For example, former State Senator George B. Keezel, Democratic candidate for the County treasurership was defeated by P. W. Rehard, a Republican, in Rockingham county. A factional fight for the treasurership hegan fifteen months ago. Keezel invested \$10,000 in a new company and started a paper to represent his side of the

Fusion won in Norfolk county. National Republican Committee man Alvah H. Martin was re-elected county clerk of Norfolk county ty by a majority of 541 over C. W. Coleman the regular Democratic candidate. Wise county Democrats won the Legislature, one Republican won in Luray, and the Democrats carried Dinwiddle. Louisa and Northumberland counties by heavy majorities. The Republicans made a good showing in Montgomery county. There was no Republican opposition in Culpeper, Loudoun and Albemare counties. Less than one-fourth the registered vote was polied in Frederick county. Tavenner, Democrat, defeated Copp, In ependent, for the State Senate by a majority of about 150 ve R. Ewell Thornton, Democrat, was elected to the State Senate I from the Fourteenth District over Alex. J. Wedderburn, Independent. Thornton received a large majority in Fairfax county, and carned Prince William and Fairfax counties. Wedderbura carried Alexandria City. Without opposition W. T. Oliver was elected to the House from Fairfax county.

Prince William elected the entire Democratic ticket, no opposition developing except in Coles District where Keys, Independent. was defeated by Russell, Democrat. A light vote was poiled and little interest was taken in the election, the battle having been won

at the June primary election. In Loudoun county there were no Republican candidates. Keith B. Wise was elected to the House of Delegates. Not more than 1.500 votes were cast.

An Independent was elected to the House in Fluvanna county. There was no opposition to the legislative ticket in Danyille. Feeble opposition developed in Pittsylvania




