STRONGLY RESEMBLES SENATOR SWANSON

A bill of special interest to the dairymen of Virginia, which passed the recent session of the Legislature and has just been signed by the governor, is one designed to prevent deception in the sale of ice cream and establishing a standard for the same.

Leachman, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed citizens of Prince William County.

At a meeting of the County School Board at the Court House on Monday, March 25, there were present G. G. Tyler, president of the Board and the following trustees: Brentsville district - R. H. Davis, J. R. Cook and J. A. Hooker; Colles district - J. M. Elliott; Manassas district - C. E. Nash, Boston Steele and D. J. Arrington; Dumfries district - Dr. D. C. Cling; Occoquan district - Corbin Thompson; L. C. Ledman and C. C. Round.
