GOVERNOR WILSON, VICTIM OF
Sedition of the People Struggling
from an Oppressive Tariff.

The National Democratic Committee has sent out a letter from Governor William Hodges Mann dealing with the present political outlook. It sums up the situation very succinctly and we publish it below for the encouragement of all Democrats and others generally who are tired of special interest rule:

"The Democrats of the state will vote today for Wilson, not only because he is a Virginian and the nominee of the Democratic Convention at Baltimore, but because in their judgment he is the best man for the place. I do not know a single Democrat who will not cheerfully and enthusiastically support Governor Wilson."

"Governor Wilson in his speech of acceptance said, 'this is not a partisan fight,' and the thinking, non-partisan members of the Republican party have reached the conclusion that justice and right are better than party divisions; they are not satisfied with the position of their party on the tariff and the trusts; they demand tariff reductions and the enforcement of the anti-trust laws and realize it never before,

that if the tariff is to be revised as to meet the demands of the people it must be done by the party which stands for a tariff for revenue with the incidental protection which necessarily results."

"They condemn the annual collection from the American people of over two billions of dollars,

of which not more than three hundred and thirty-five millions find their way into the treasury, the balance going steadily and continuously into the pockets of the protected manufacturers."

"The people—whether Democratic, Republicans or third-termers are opposed to all trusts and combinations born of the tariff or otherwise which creates monopolies and strangles individual enterprise and competition, but for equality of all and remuneration of the individuals who transgress the law prohibiting trusts just as other law breakers are punished."

"They want an honest, economical administration of the government, with due regard to the interests of the people by a president who is under no obligation, express or implied, to any special interest."

"They want a progressive pres-

ident who will stand up to the advanced needs and requirements of the people, and who understands that some things, such as in-

stance, as a downward tariff revision, must be brought about gradually and steadily, with proper regard for the business interests of the country, in which all the people are more or less directly or indirectly interested."

"The dismantled Republican and third-term voter will support Governor Wilson because they realize that he is making his fight for the people; that he is taking them into his confidence and seeking counsel from them, not as one who directs and controls, but as one who leads for the purpose of carrying into effect their policies and wishes."

"Governor Wilson has been through the crucible of the primary and has come out without spot or blemish."

"He has demonstrated in New Jersey his capacity for leadership and his fidelity to pre-election pledges. He is a clean, strong man, willing and able to meet squarely and bravely every issue which may arise in the campaign after it."

"He knows that there is wisdom in counsel and will surround himself with advisers of intelligence, character and standing."
