Soil needs a balanced ration just as much as an animal does and will respond just as readily to careful treatment. Commercial fertilizers are expensive, contain a great deal of waste material and will produce no more and not as permanent results as will a consistent change of diet. Prince William county soil will grow almost any kind of grain that any soil will and will, produce grass in abundance when properly treated. A three-year rotation of corn, grass and pasture is good but a five year change of corn, wheat, oats, grass and pasture is better. 



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
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
