It is not possible to say just what legislation will be considered in the special session, but there is a disposition to make the scope of activity as narrow as possible. Chairman Underwood of the Ways and Means Committee' expects to be ready with the tariff bills, but as there will be considerable debate on them th session is likely to stretch into months. 


