THE SEVENTEENTH AMENDMENT

The Secretary of State has received official notice of the ratification by thirty-five states of the joint resolution passed by the sixty-second Congress providing for the direct election by the people of United States Senators. The daily papers have reported that one other state has ratified it, making thirty-six, the required three-quarters of the forty-eight states. As soon as the Secretary receives official notice of this last state he will issue his announce ments to each state that the amendment has become a part of the Constitution of the United States and it will be the duty of the legislature of each state to pass laws providing for the placing of the names of candidates for this high office upon the regular ticket. 
